BRIDGE TOLLS SHOCK - IMMEDIATE INCREASES IMPLEMENTED

Tamar Bridge commuters found themselves paying fifty per cent more for their tolls within four days of the increase being authorised by the Department of Transport.

Following an enquiry in January this year the Inspector decided that a compelling case had been put for the increase to be implemented and he reported accordingly to the department.

Lord Adonis authorised the increase on the Tuesday and the increased tolls were effective from 5 a.m. the following Friday.

Tamar Tag holders will find themselves being charged 75 pence inset of 50 pence each time they cross to Devon. Cash payers will pay £1.50, up from £1.00.

The Bridge and Ferry authorities sought to justify the speed of the increase pointing out that they had applied for it last May and expected to implement it last December. They were losing £10,000 of anticipated revenue per day before the rise took place. The Bridge and Ferry had been operating at a deficit for three years and had been funded by cash reserves which were now almost depleted. The increase in tolls would generate an expected £3.5 million per year additional income.

The last cash toll increase was sixteen years ago, the last concession increase thirteen years ago. Since then considerable capital had been expended on strengthening and widening the Tamar Bridge, replacing all three Torpoint ferries with enlarged versions, and introducing the convenience of electronic tolling intended to speed through traffic.

On a radio interview Bridge and Ferry Manager David List said that enquiries had shown that a majority of bridge and ferry users would prefer to see small toll increases every two or three years rather than substantial increases after around fifteen years, and this would be borne in mind for the future.

Meanwhile commuters and shoppers to Plymouth have to pay the 50% increase in addition to paying out for anticipated increased petrol costs making car travel more expensive than ever. The alternative is to use the bus or the enhanced rail services which now call at Saltash Station, or avoid bridge tolls and expensive city centre parking fees by checking out the excellent range of shops which we have in Saltash.



TEAM RUN FOR HEROES

Following last years successful 'Run for a Grand' in which they raised £1,000 for St Lukes Hospice, Roger and Heather Smyly are doing a triple run this year hoping to raise a similar sum for charity.

They were overwhelmed last year at the support given by friends and by visitors 'For Your Rooms,' the furniture showroom that they own in Fore Street. This has spurred them on to enter the Plymouth 'Hoe Ten' miler, which they

completed in February. Now they are heavily in training for the Tavistock half marathon in April and that in Plymouth in May.

Meanwhile, they are out running four times a week including a long run each Sunday.

This year they have decided to support 'Help for Heroes,' especially since their son Luke recently joined the Royal Engineers. This is also the current Mayor of Saltash's main charity.

SALTASH WINS MAJOR LOTTERY BID FOR LANDMARK NEW CELTIC CROSS

It was announced yesterday that Saltash has won a Flagship award of £450,000 from Lottery Community Spaces.

The award will enable the development of Elwell Woods and the construction of an iconic modern interpretation of a Celtic Cross, by Cornish artist Simon Thomas.

The site lies at the Gateway to Cornwall, alongside the Tamar Road Bridge, with spectacular views upriver and across to Dartmoor. The neglected scrub woodland has been closed to the public for nearly 50 years, and will be sympathetically regenerated as a community woodland and wildlife habitat.

On an elevated part of the site, the spectacular 20 metre

cross will be built as a landmark greeting motorists entering Cornwall. The scale is similar to that of the Angel of the North and it is hoped that visitors will help regenerate the town centre economy and come to symbolise South East Cornwall.

The £ half million project is led by Saltash Waterfront Residents Association and supported by the Town Council, Gateway CIC, and Cornwall Council, with high profile public endorsement by Tim Smit (Eden Project) and Kevin Lavery (Cornwall CEO).

Project leader Joe Ellison says

"this award has enormous implications for Saltash and Cornwall. It is a reward for nine months of hard work by a small dedicated project team, working closely with the local community.

Saltash is arguably the most innovative town in Cornwall, and has recently been declared the most desirable postcode in the UK. This project will add to the environmental regeneration of the town and Waterside area.

It is expected to be completed over a two year period, and is subject to compliance with a few remaining conditions to obtain planning permission"

HIGH LOCAL PETROL PRICES CAUSE CONCERN

The high price of petrol in Saltash, as against elsewhere in the area is causing increasing concern to motorists now hit in addition with increased toll charges.

While increasing petrol costs are a national problem for drivers Saltash Council's Industry Commerce Transportation and Tourism Committee believes that the Town is being hit particularly hard with prices far higher than in Plymouth a few miles away.

The Town's Chamber of Commerce and Industry which has previously

negotiated price reductions with local outlets, shares this concern and it was agreed that Town Councillor Joe Ellison together with a Chamber of Commerce representative should meet with local petrol station managers to see if anything could be done to bring local prices more into keeping with the regional average.

SALTASH SAVED FROM INCINERATOR ACROSS THE TAMAR

The threat of a giant incinerator across the river from Saltash with its tower dominating the Tamar Bridge and pumping noxious fumes across the town is no more.

Ernesettle is now off the agenda as far as plans for a giant incinerator to consume South Devon and East Cornwall's waste is concerned. Members of the action group STIFLE which includes many Saltash Residents including Town Councillors were suitably jubilant to know that the town is not to be dominated by the structure on a green field site just across the river from Brunel Green and bordering on the Tamar Valley area of outstanding natural beauty.

Two prospective sites are still being considered, that by Virador at Lee Mill, and that of a German company in the North Yard of Devonport Dockyard.

STIFLE will however, continue to monitor the use that Plymouth City Council may have in mind for the green field site at Ernesettle which was considered for the incinerator, Saltash town councillor and STIFLE activist Joe Ellison advised. It could still be considered for some different form of waste disposal.

The North Yard site, Councillor Martin Gee reminded all, is still within

sight of Saltash and a southeasterly wind from there could bring air pollution to Saltash. The town council is seeking further information on this projected site.

CRIME FIGURES FALL BY TWO THIRDS

Crimes in the Saltash area were down by 69% over the equivalent period last year, PC Simon Fletcher was pleased to tell the March Town Council meeting. Forty-two reported crimes contrasted with 130 the previous year.

There had however, been two burglaries from dwellings. In reply to questions PC Fletcher advised that there was no reason to connect these two burglaries.

"Most house burglaries are not planned in advance. They are opportunist, offenders take advantage of seeing an unsecured building," he warned, adding, "Most burglaries do not take place at night but during the daytime when homes are more likely to be empty."

Deputy Mayor Adam Killeya took the opportunity to thank PC Fletcher for his work in the town, where he has been involved since the 1980's, and wish him well for his forthcoming retirement from the Police Force.

CONCERN FOR WILDLIFE IN COMMUNITY WOODLAND

Plans for a giant Celtic cross in a managed Elwell woodland site adjacent to the Tamar Bridge have been recommended for approval by the town council subject to assurance of protection for the area's wildlife.

Amended plans for the community woodland area had come back to the town council due to concerns for tree roots on an amended right of way, and concerns for a bat survey.

All is sorted with regard to diverting the right of way without harming the trees, Joe Ellison, who had put forward the plans advised the town council. While bats had been observed in the woodland there was no evidence of their roosting but he was happy for a full bat survey to be carried out.

Environmental concerns had been raised by the Saltash Environmental Action Group. They had pointed out the importance of retaining a wide tree canopy next to a main road to absorb carbon dioxide and were concerned at loss of trees and of undergrowth on the woodland floor. There had been no proper survey of wildlife currently in the woodland, or what might be attracted to it, they claimed, and they expressed disappointment that the proposed pond or wetland area no longer featured in plans.

The concrete surrounds for a twenty metre high Celtic Cross caused environmental concerns and SEA asked instead for low trees or shrubs

to surround it.

Stone paving, not concrete, was planned around the cross, replied Mr Ellison who confirmed that the wetland area could be re-instated into the plan.

Town Councillor Derek Holley proposed recommending approval to the amended plans subject to the maintenance of as much woodland floor cover as possible to include a wetland, the minimum reduction of trees and the supervision of an ecologist. "This young woodland, properly managed could be of considerable benefit to the town," he believed. As to the Celtic Cross, which was selected by townfolk from among a number of designs ten years ago, he described it as of "modern and uncompromising design. The Angel of the North proved controversial, now it is accepted as an icon and a tourist attraction."

The council voted unanimously in favour of the amended plans for the woodland and for the cross which was then dependent upon the outcome of an application for a lottery grant. Confirmation has now been received that the grant is now on offer. We now await confirmation as to Cornwall County planning committee accepting the recommendation of the town Council.

FREE RAIL TICKETS TEMPT TAMAR BRIDGE USERS

In an unusual step the Saltash Rail Users' Group are offering disillusioned Tamar Bridge users an alternative to their daily commute by car. People are being offered a free weekly ticket between Saltash and Plymouth in the hope that they find it easier and cheaper than jumping into their cars.

Richard Bickford, from SRUG said 'It seemed an appropriate time to try this scheme out, Road Bridge users have just been hit by a rise in the toll and fuel prices are continually creeping upward. We know that the train won't work for everyone, but if you work in or around Plymouth City Centre, then it may be a viable alternative, it only takes 10-12 minutes and can cost from as little as £1.50 return per day.'

The scheme is being paid for with some funding that has been gained through taking part in rail based consultations, but if the scheme proves successful and more people start to use the rail services then more funding may be sought. Mr Bickford, also commented that "the more people that use the service we have, then the more services we can get. We are just trying to accelerate the process a bit".

Over recent years the rail service provided at Saltash has improved significantly. Roger Creagh-Osborne, Chairman of SRUG added "We have around 40% more trains than 4 years ago and we will fight for further improvements. The trains are more reliable and the fares are affordable for most. We would urge you to find out more".

Pill Ward Saltash



This is not what you are going to want to hear but I reluctantly supported the demise of the old Caradon Council subsidised parking card system. Many of you will have these white plastic cards which gave you cheaper parking throughout SE Cornwall.

The cards themselves can still be used and topped up at the machines, but at normal rates. At the end of last year I managed to get myself onto the Parking Policy Panel at County Hall which is trying to pull together six different parking systems into one. I admit that I did this mainly so that I could try and persuade the Council to recognise that Saltash's town centre economy is drastically affected by the proximity of Plymouth and that hikes in parking charges will damage the viability of our town centre. I continue to press this point at every available opportunity, so much so that the Chairman of the Panel (who is a genuine good guy and very fair) took me to task this week and pointed out, quite rightly, that I was there to represent the rest of Cornwall as well. Back to the old Caradon parking card. The problem of fairness was that only Caradon and the old Restormel district had these cards and to keep them as they were would have meant that the other ratepayers and car parkers throughout the county would have had to subsidise a system which benefited only the 25% of Caradon households which took up and used the cards. To extend the system throughout Cornwall would have cost over £2 million of subsidy on the rates plus the cost of the machines in each car park. It was indefensible to keep the subsidy on the cards and I took the view that it was more important to support the removal of this subsidy (which would have got through anyway) and later fight the bigger battle of trying to keep our parking charges down. Hey ho. If only life was straightforward. Meanwhile all the county is having an interim smaller rise in parking charges while these bigger battles are being fought.

Why put them up at all? Because county finances are extremely tight and will get tighter and the car parks are looked upon as a "cash cow" to generate income. Thank goodness all the panel, every member, has said that this is a wrong starting point and that we will look at other factors as well.

The next question you will

ask is this? If finances are this tight why is Saltash getting £450,000 to create Elwell Park and the Celtic Cross (Elwell Park will be down Lower Fore Street, on the left under the road bridge and through the woods)? Leaving aside any benefits to the residents that the park will bring and the tourist and mapping impact the cross will have the simple fact is that this is national money for projects like this that would have gone elsewhere for something similar if we had not got it. It is not money that we could have bid for and then used for car parks or public toilets or schools. So we might as well have it, is the way I look at it. Anyway well done to Joe Ellison's team, the Waterside Residents Association and Saltash Town Council for getting this award. It is a cracking example of how a few determined people can "win" money for community projects. Why don't you form a Residents Association in your area - it is worthwhile, interesting and fun and can reap decent rewards for your area.

Leave the best till last. Hands up those who want your bins emptied once a fortnight. This is not, I repeat not, on the cards yet, but if you want to stave this off then one thing that you can do to help is to recycle. There are loads of households along Saltash's streets that do not recycle and plenty more that only recycle some bits and pieces. If we can keep our landfill down by recycling more and more then there will be less pressure to change the existing system. So if you know somebody who never bothers to recycle have a polite and kind word with them and say what might happen if they don't. Personally having experience of fortnightly recycling at my daughter's place up the line I would anyway fight this one to the bitter end, if it ever comes up. I am certain my fellow Town and Cornwall councillors would do the same. It is a lousy, smelly system which is a fine sentiment to end on. Here's hoping for a fine warm spring with light rain only at nights, no blight on my potatoes and a glorious summer. Happy Days.

FORE STREET SHOPS ENHANCEMENT SCHEME

Empty shops in Fore Street are to be utilised to promote local organisations and, it is hoped, as start-up centres for new business. The former Learning Centre which faces up Fore Street is proposed for use as an 'incubator,' for new businesses.

TOWN CENTRE FLATS TURNED DOWN

Four flats to be built adjacent to listed buildings between Victoria Gardens and the Wesley Church have been turned down for approval by the town council.

There had been considerable opposition from local residents some of whom described the plans as a gross over development that would destroy the historic setting of listed buildings at the foot of Callington Road. The building formerly named 'Prospect House' would lose its fine prospect over the Tamar and Tavy Valleys, one resident told the town council meeting.

The plans involved over-development of the site and overlooking of homes in Fenton Park, believed Councillor Joe Ellison, and Councillor Derek Holley added that they could "compromise the quality of the local environment to a considerable degree." The council unanimously recommended refusal of permission for the four flats to be built.

The Town's Community Interest Company is seeking to break up the large premises into smaller units where new businesses can establish themselves, before, if successful, moving on elsewhere.

Items from the town's rich history may be displayed in the former Marianne's dress shop where Saltash Heritage have been invited to promote their organisation and the town's museum and local History centre in Lower Fore Street. Saltash College is also interested in putting some art on display. A Volunteer's Agency is being suggested for an empty shop at the foot of Fore Street, while the Community Interest Company seeks to work generally with the Town Council in improving and acquiring high quality window displays as required.

All is aimed at enhancing the appearance and attractiveness of Saltash as a shopping centre while long term tenants for the empty shops continue to be sought.

Saltash has something to shout about!

Saltash will be holding its first Town Crier competition on Saturday 1st May. The event has been organised by Saltash Town Crier, Brian Whipp, who will not be able to compete, and will feature as part of the Town Council sponsored May Fair.

Taking part will be around a dozen Town Criers and their Escorts from the local area who will compete for titles of Best Cry, Best Dressed Escort and Best Dressed Crier. The first Town Crier competitions were held in Greece in 396 BC to find the person who could best announce winners of the games. The Criers were also used to announce the severing of relationships, which would lead to an official proclamation of war. Not always a popular person in town, as he would announce scandal and bad news as well as the good and favourable, Town Criers enjoyed royal protection, and the command "don't shoot the messenger" had very real significance. Having read a proclamation, usually at the door of the local inn, the Crier would then nail it to the door post - which is where the expression "posting a notice" comes from.

31 is a magic number for Alan

Alan Williams turned 31 years old last December and he set himself a challenge for 2010. His New Years resolution is to run the equivalent of 31 races at the age of 31, with the aim of raising £31,000 for the Cystic Fibrosis Trust, and one of those races will be the Saltash

Half Marathon, which forms part of Saltash May Fair, on May 2nd.

Cystic Fibrosis (CF) is a serious inherited disease, which mainly affects the lungs and pancreas, but can involve other organs. Symptoms usually begin in early childhood and include persistent cough, wheeze, repeated chest infections,

malabsorption of food, and general ill health. Alan was diagnosed with CF at the age of four but finds that his course of tablets, a watchful eye on his diet and staying active keeps him healthy and he has spent just two weeks in hospital, through CF, as a result.

Alan said: 'I do not let it affect my life, to any great degree. Other people with the condition are not so fortunate, however, and require organ transplants and long stays in hospital - in several cases, even this is not enough and many people younger than myself have died from CF. In fact, until very recently, the average life expectancy for someone born with CF was 31, the age I reached on Christmas Day 2009. I am extremely lucky in that my condition, according to my specialists, is now at its most manageable ever, which is attributable to a great extent to the fact I am able to run four or five times a week'.

His effort, which will involve running around 500 miles in the races alone as well as hundreds more in training, will raise money to help the CF Trust fund research which could transform the lives of thousands of people in the years to come and, ultimately, could contribute to the ongoing quest to find a cure for the condition.

SALTASH IN TRANSITION FOR GREEN FUTURE

Saltash is going greener, having this year joined with 275 other communities worldwide by becoming an official Transition Town.

This means that our community is seeking ways to address the issues of climate change and depletion of natural resources, in particular oil. The core principle of 'think globally, act locally' involves encouraging Saltash residents to work out local solutions as to how to feed themselves, stay warm, and travel with minimal environmental impact.

Living with less oil and environmental pollution is not just a challenge, it can be a key to a far more enjoyable and fulfilling lifestyle, claim Saltash Environmental Action who are promoting means of putting Transition Town principles into action. The post oil era, they believe, gives us all a unique opportunity to create a better lifestyle than that "based on greed, war and the myth of perpetual growth." Many will have already seen members of Saltash Environmental Action in Fore Street on Saturday mornings, providing live music for shoppers while promoting themselves and their activities, the objective being to make local shopping for local produce, a fun and enjoyable activity.

Other Transition Towns, since the movement started in

50th Anniversary Celebrations of the New Burraton Community Centre

From a newspaper cutting of the Guardian and Gazette dated 10 May, 1951, there would seem to have been a great deal of interest in "the prospect of the provision of a hut at Warfelton Estate or at Burraton for the use of local organisations. Public money would have to be spent on providing accommodation, but there is no call for anything elaborate, a wooden or nissen hut with just the bare essential amenities would serve the purpose well and the income, from hiring, would probably enable the bulk of the cost to be repaid."

The Saltash Borough Council had been made aware that the Burraton Community Association was in the process of raising money to qualify for a Government grant to build a permanent structure. A comment made in the article by the journalist was that if the worthy aim was achieved that the building would enhance the area.

The matter must have been a hot potato for it was not until the edition of the Guardian and Gazette dated 11 February, 1954, when it was reported that the Borough Council had finally approved the proposal for a communal hall at Burraton. It was not many years before the Burraton Community Association was able to build a permanent building and the opening of the new hall

took place on Saturday, 14 May, 1960 and high tea was served 4pm, price 3/- each, 15p in today's money. The hall was officially opened by HRH Prince Chula of Thailand. The President of the Burraton Community Association was Mr J Down, The offices of Secretary and Treasurer were both filled by Mr M Huggins, the Social Secretary was Mr G Hodge and Powell-Thomas were the builders.

Since to opening in 1960, the Burraton Community Centre has been enlarged to provide a second hall, such is the use by the community. Now, in May 2010, in celebration of the 50 years of the NEW Burraton Community Centre, the user organisations are going to provide a wide selection of events - concerts, dances, beetle drive, quiz, water colour exhibition, demonstrations of karate, yoga, dance, kick, keep fit, Tai Chi, amateur radio and taster sessions in vocal coaching and water colour. Yes, we are celebrating between Monday, 10 May and Saturday, 22 May to prove that a good decision was made all those years ago!

A CORNISH WRITER'S RATTLING ADVENTURES OF CORNISHMEN ABROAD

Adoptive Cornishman E V Thompson has, in his most recent tales, broken from the rip-roaring sagas of heady days during the Cornish Mining boom and bust. Instead he now follows Cornish adventurers on their Diaspora to the farthest reaches of the 19th Century world.

The hero of his latest adventure. "The Dream Traders" is a Cornishman Luke Trewarne trading in a China awakening to the outside world of "foreign devils" while it was still the "Heavenly Kingdom." It is best described as a rattling yarn of derring do set against the backdrop of the Opium Wars, the inglorious nadir of our Imperial adventure when British armed force was used to protect the profitable narcotics trade.

Within the opening forty pages we experience a running battle between a British merchantman and Chinese navy junks, a typhoon, a passing encounter with pirates and a near rape. Then the pace speeds up a bit.

E V Thompson clearly uses his experience in the Hong Kong Police Narcotics Bureau as well as considerable research into the early days of that colony in order to produce this epic of the clash between an ancient and stagnant civilisation and a brash and burgeoning British Empire. The pace of the action leaves little time for serious character development but as an action-packed swashbuckling saga of clean cut heroes set against dastardly villains, with plenty of bodice-ripping on the side, set in a little known period of our imperial history "The Dream Traders" is well recommended as a good old fashioned yarn.

Packed with action too is a recent paperback addition to E V Thompson's tales of

Cornishmen abroad. In "No less than the Journey" the scene is set during 'reconstruction' of post Civil War divided America. From the honky-tonk world of New Orleans to the Wild Western Frontier our hero from Bodmin Moor, Wes Curnow, has adventures aplenty as he seeks to meet up with his gold prospecting Cornish uncle. River pirates, desperate outlaw gangs and, shocking to say, a renegade Cornishman are among the perils that young Wes and his US Marshall pal have to contend with. But life has its compensations as a rough and ready riverboat croupier, a Southern Senator's genteel daughter and a half caste teenage girl vie for his affections.

Again there is all the fast paced action and excitement that the combination of Cornish writer E V Thompson and the Wild West in its lawless heyday would lead one to expect.

'TIME WARP' GROCER'S SHOP RESTORED TO ORIGINAL

The front of Elliott's Store in Lower Fore Street, retained as a 'time warp' Grocers' shop of the 1950's is to be restored to its original condition as funds permit.

The frontage of the shop is currently in a sorry state and the Tamar Protection Society to whom the late Mr Frank Elliot bequeathed the store, wish to take the opportunity to restore the frontage to its former state. The property, originally a butcher's shop, became a grocery store in 1880 and remained in the Elliott family from then until the society took it over and opened it as a museum with much of the grocery stock on display.

Saltash Town Council was delighted at the plans for full restoration and granted unanimous approval for plans to alter the shop front of the building in the Lower Fore Street Conservation Area.

The Tamar Protection Society has obtained a cost estimate of £25,000 and is applying for grant funding of £20,000 hoping, if successful, to raise the balance of £5,000 locally.

WISHING WELL AT WAITROSE

On 30th March, Waitrose and the Rotary Club of Saltash began a partnership to raise money for poorer parts of the world with limited or no access to fresh, clear water. A vortex wishing well has been placed in the Waitrose store at Saltash to collect coin donations, providing an element of fun as the coins spin around the well prior to falling into the collecting box.

The well was inaugurated by John Parker, Branch Manager, and Gerry Stevenson, Chairman of the International Committee of Saltash Rotary.

Funds collected are being split equally between the two organisations.

The chosen project for Rotary is to create a fresh water supply for a village near Jinja in Uganda.

Water is one of our essentials of life which everyone tends to take for granted. When the tap is turned on, if it is a little discoloured, just wait for a few minutes or so and the pipes flow clear. This part of Uganda is an area where there are no pipes, where the water is certainly discoloured and before a pan is dipped into the pool, it may well be that cattle, goats and other animals have

been treading and drinking and defecating in it. It is not a question of finding somewhere else - there is nowhere else, so support for water projects such as this is essential for the health of all the villagers.

The aim of the project is to channel natural water from a spring to run through various layers of material, e.g. stones, gravel, sand, and vegetation, before emerging from a water spout which is sited within a concrete area. This affords villagers the opportunity to fill their containers, pots & pans with water for themselves, and

for animals to drink from the overflow without contaminating the supply in any way. The concreted area means water is always cleanly available without trampling through mud.

This system of water provision has proved most effective over many years and costs in the region of £500 per spring. All work is undertaken by the villagers themselves and Rotary and its supporters on the ground supply the materials (stones, gravel, sand, vegetation, water spout, cement etc) and transport required.
