futuristic Celtic Cross which, at 62 feet is taller than the acclaimed 'Angel of the North' should be ready to greet visitors and returning Cornish residents to Saltash as soon as next Summer. After considerable delays, mainly relating to the proposed re-landscaping of the adjacent Elwell Woods, Cornwall Council has at last approved the erection of the cross.

While it has provoked some local controversy, with certain residents citing it as a waste of funding, the project

received the full backing of from a number put forward Tim Smit, whose projects for the lost gardens of Helligan and the Eden Project have vastly boosted Cornwall's tourist industry.

" I am absolutely delighted that we have the go-ahead, it has been a long time coming," Councillor Joe Ellison, who has been largely responsible for pushing the project through, told the 'Observer.' "This has been the key to drawing down £450,000 down promised. W drawi already We are now drawing up a lease with the Saltash Waterfront Residents' Association and can then put the project out to tender."

This marks progress in a plan that originally began as a Millennium project. The design, by Simon Thomas, was selected by public vote,

originally for a site close to Carkeel roundabout. The currently planned site, immediately adjacent to the Tamar Road Bridge, will be the main feature of a

regenerated area of neglected. overgrown and rubbishstrewn woodland. The regeneration of Elwell

Woods as a wildlife area is also aimed at going ahead over the next year. A number of surveys for bats, reptiles and three tree surveys had to be carried out before any work could be authorised. These have been completed and it is anticipated that work on clearing the area can begin early in 2011. It will then cease for around six months during the bird breeding season to be completed, hopefully, by the end of the year.

Meanwhile, Cross is likely to be built "off site" and brought to Saltash to be erected in one piece. This promises to be an event well worth watching.

Something odd has been

happening at the other end of the county. For the first time in living memory an emergency budget has been put together by Cornwall Council, and probably also for the first time the proposal is to cut front-line services. Cornwall's budget comes from council tax and government grants and bear in mind when you read on that the government has for years been ordering councils to do all sorts of extra work and provide extra services but not giving us enough

extra grant to do that

Basically now the government has cut the grant it gives councils, but expects us to run the same services. and our grant is cut by £110 million, so if you want to know who to blame for coming wide scale reductions in services, just for once don't blame Cornwall Council. To cut short a long and thoroughly unpleasant story the last round of cuts is 10 million pounds of the sort of cuts which we will really feel. Accordingly we have been batting our end and trying to hold up the services we think are important and I, for example, have been concerned that cuts to libraries and leisure centres should have the minimum impact on Saltash and also that the Road Safety budget should not suffer. My fear has been that the administration would go for easy targets and a good example of an apparently easy target is the footpaths network and the relatively small part of the budget spent on that. Odd you may think and indeed something to be cut, but having an interest in footpaths I know that, incredibly, the county footpaths network as a tourist attraction is the second biggest earner of cash in

Some Cornwall Councillors think that Bude Town Council should subsidise the service from their half million pounds of reserve money but others say that is double taxation, in other words asking local people to pay for something they have already paid for through their normal Cornwall council tax .What

do you think? I have raised the Bude question because here in Saltash we may be moving towards that situation ourselves. This really is thinking the unthinkable, more so in our case because if we want to keep our town looking decent, with litter picked up, road safety issues dealt with and kerb weeds

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



FROM THE MAYOR'S PARLOUR...

As this will be my last column before Christmas, I hope that all of you have an enjoyable and safe festive season: a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

It has been a challenging but very successful year for Saltash – with many triumphs but also tragedies, most notably the shocking loss of two members of our community this month. Our sympathies and thoughts are with their family and friends at this difficult time.

This year has also seen exciting several new developments for Saltash - in particular our first Salt Fest music festival and Making Saltash Greener fortnight, as well as likely completion in the next week or two of the Town Council Cemetery Extension: a large and very important project. There have been challenges too though: the withdrawal of some Cornwall Services as the budget begins to bite, the ongoing challenge of Fore Street regeneration. and of course threat to our Cornish border, with the proposal to have a cross-border MP

However what always strikes me, throughout these triumphs, tragedies, successes and challenges, is that Saltash always meets them as a community, working together and supporting each other, which is part of what makes us so lucky to live here.

During November Merryn and I attended the re-opening of Elliot's Store following a very successful refurbishment, Saltash Town Council's Remembrance Service, the Place Greenwich Remembrance Service, the Saltash Sailing Club Annual Dinner, the Saltash Waterside Resident's Association AGM, The Brunel Ladies Harmony Chorus concert raising money for Teenage Cancer, the Saltash Air Cadets Open

NEW STRATEGY FOR SPORT IN SALTASH

roper pitches and enhanced changing facilities are promised as part of a strategy to improve publicly owned open spaces.

Soccer, rugby, hockey and tennis players of all ages and abilities should benefit from Cornwall Council's plan for local facilities as put to the town council by County Cllr. Bob Austin. The current situation in

Saltash is dire, he proclaimed, citing a lack of pitches, poor pitch conditions and unsatisfactory pitch sharing arrangements. In addition there are unacceptable changing facilities, inadequate car parking, lack of flood lighting and substandard showers and toilets. If teams are promoted, as some of our youth teams seem likely to be, they will be unable to go up a league if their facilities are not of an acceptable standard. Chapel Field he described as

having outdated changing facilities and a cricket pitch little used due to its steep camber. In addition it currently has well-used rugby and football pitches of full size. One option includes a new club

house and changing facility by the Liskeard Road and two full size football or two full size rugby pitches, if the latter this could become the town's rugby hub. An alternative option for Chapel Field includes senior cricket and hockey pitches with junior rugby and soccer and perhaps

a mini soccer pitch. By contrast Moorlands Lane currently has an excellent clubhouse and acceptable changing rooms. The full size rugby pitch is good but the junior football pitch, sloping towards Callington Road, is not so good. Plans include levelling off the field to allow possibly senior hockey and cricket pitches and a junior football pitch.

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
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Funds raised for Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Derriford

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LIBRARIES AND BUSES FACE COUNTY CUTS

Of Cornwall's twenty libraries and one-stop shops, over half – that is eleven – are likely to be axed as part of the county's spending cuts. This was part of the grim news given by County Councillor Bob Austin to the town Council's November meeting.

Since footfall in Saltash library makes it among the best nine used in Cornwall it closure but this cannot be guaranteed.

Transport subsidies are also likely to hit Cornwall's bus services. While the buses serving the town are not subsidised, and would therefore appear safe, it may be that pensioners' bus passes will be restricted to use only after 9.30 am, as against all day at present. maintainance of public

rights of way is also to be reduced, to the concern of Cllr Peter Clements since this has only recently been improved. The town council is to object to this intended cut. Other cuts, aimed to cover the county budget's £10 million shortfall, include

leisure centre, waste recycling at supermarkets (such as Saltash's Waitrose), street cleaning, public conveniences, beach management and park Maintainance including grass

cutting. The better news is that such front line services as adult seems less likely to face care and childrens' services seem secure. Also a zero increase in council tax for the next two years is anticipated. The county was initially faced with saving £120 million, the majority of £110 million had been found. These final budget cuts, which have gone before the cabinet and were due to be put to the Scrutiny Committee, are aimed at making up the final shortfall.
