Don't Charge for Tamar Tags – Raise Ferry Fares Saltash Suggests

The proposed monthly charge to all Tamar Tag holders of eighty pence per month however much they use it would be particularly unfair to infrequent users, Saltash Town Councillors agreed. They submitted a response to the Tamar Bridge and Torpoint Ferry Committee's consultation unanimously agreeing that this charge was not an appropriate response to the authority's funding crisis.

They added, that the Saltash Town Council is disappointed that other alternatives, such as a differential tolling charge between the bridge and the Torpoint ferry had not been given proper consideration.

Reductions in tolls received over each of the last three years at least had resulted in income falling short by half a million pounds, County Councillor Bob Austin, who sits on the bridge and ferry joint committee, told the Town Council. Meanwhile had maintenance costs increased and the reserves held fallen to £2 million, the minimum level which should be retained.

Officers had recommended to the committee that rather than increase the cost of tag or cash crossing an eighty pence charge per month be added to each account. This would help pay for the tags which so far have been issued free of charge.

The Tamar Bridge currently subsidises the Torpoint Ferry by a ratio of three to one, added County Councillor Derek Holley, also a bridge and ferry committee member. If it were not for the bridge users' subsidy ferry crossings could cost over five pounds. Councillors had asked the officers to prepare a report on the option of recovering the £1/2 million shortfall by a modest increase on cash paid fares for the ferry. This would not affect Torpoint residents who used the tag, but would slightly increase the sum paid by holiday makers and occasional However this option was not shown to the bridge committee. "I am angry that this option, put forward by all three Saltash members of the committee was totally ignored", said County Councillor Joe Ellison, the third local bridge and ferry committee member. He added that one reason might be that

any toll increase must be referred to the Secretary of State and that it costs £40,000 to do so. "They simply chose the simplest option" complained all three Saltash Committee members. The eighty pence is easier to collect, whether or not it is the fairest solution to the shortfall.

"Those who use their tag only occasionally will pay a disproportionate charge to daily commuters if this charge comes into affect", added Mayor Councillor David Yates.

The Town Council's submissions will be considered before a decision is made.



hat was anticipated to be a day's seminar followed by a dinner and dance had an exciting conclusion for a local beautician who bought back to Saltash a prestigious national award.

lanning is a dirty word. Planning is a dirty word.
Well, it is to some people who think that all planning officers are corrupt, that councillors who sit on planning committees are even more corrupt and that the whole system stinks. I can see all that nodding ..

Before I explain about

corruption please understand

two things: first is that most applications go to Saltash Town Council (STC) for debate and a recommendation. If that is the same as the Cornwall Planning Officer's (CC) recommendation then all is OK. If not then STC may ask the CC officer to justify their reasoning and this is followed by STC having an internet debate and vote, (all open to the public). If STC still disagree with county then they may ask (through their Cornwall Councillor) for the application to go to Planning East, which is a higher Cornwall committee for a debate and decision. There is an even higher committee for huge applications. The second thing is that there are some big housing applications coming up so perhaps now is a good time to try and lay this demon to rest.

Anyway my problem with corruption is that I just cannot see how it works in the sort of system we have. To start with STC do not have an officer report so it cannot work in that way in Saltash. Theoretically it is possible at Planning East level for a county officer to be bribed to produce a report that is unfair to one of the parties concerned, and I suppose that on rare occasions nationwide it goes on. Why rare? Because councillors give those reports such intense scrutiny, as does the internet-using public, that something not right is jumped upon mercilessly. I know that because I sit on Cornwall's Planning East committee which every month looks at certain applications. These are or contentious large applications or otherwise special ones such as those brought forward by STC through their Cornwall Councillors. We give the officers a really hard time on many occasions, for many

reasons, one of which is if their reports are wrong or not good enough. We pick on and ask for explanations for mistakes or inconsistencies. Come along to a Planning East meeting and see for yourself. It is a rare meeting of Planning East where we deliver every verdict in line officers with the I have recommendations. been at meetings where every officer recommendation was


reversed. Everyone! So what about councillor corruption? Again I am sure it goes on nationwide, on rare occasions. Why again rare? Because it would be virtually impossible, on Planning East for example, to bribe and get away with bribing enough councillors to swing a vote... we have 15 councillors there. four Independents, four Lib Dems, five Tories, one UKIP and one Mebyon Kernow. If other committees reflect ours are they then argumentative disparate bunch who freely criticise and disagree with each other's viewpoints at every meeting...I mean that....at every meeting. At STC level there is just the same rigorous debate. We really do try at all levels to get to a fair decision based on planning law. I just cannot see corruption paying off, it would be so difficult to get it to work and extremely risky. It is not much good either saying a committee chairman could be got at. Why? Because basically they just conduct the meeting and usually don't even vote unless there is a tied vote. If they tried to unfairly lead discussion they would be jumped upon.

So does the system stink? Well here I have some

sympathy because planning law is nowadays set down by the Cornwall Local Plan and the NPPF, the National Planning Framework, a slim, vague document we have to abide by. If we give a decision that goes against the NPPF the applicant can take it to an inspector, and if our decision is unreasonable they can ask for an award of costs. The problem some people see (and I am simplifying this a bit for lack of space) is that the NPPF is based on assumptions, such as that "sustainable" development is OK Sometimes this can fly in the face of what appears to be common sense: for example a new house close to Saltash town centre can get away without any parking spaces because people should catch buses etc, when it is most likely, people say, that they will still have two cars and have to park on the road. The other thing I don't like is that while the applicant can appeal if they are turned down, the opposition has almost no right of appeal, so, for example, if you don't like a wind turbine close to you and after due process it is passed....tough....but if the developer is refused he has another chance with an appeal inspector. On the whole, though, I think the NPPF is reasonable.

From The Mayor's Parlour...

Christmas is coming and so,

active, snowfall is exiting for the less active, the elderly and those in poor health winter can be a miserable and often life threatening time of year with many vulnerable people left cold and confined to their homes. There is a lot of advice available on how to cope with weather, I summarised some of it below: Follow these tips to help keep you your family and your neighbours warm and well in extremely cold weather.

Get ready by making a list of the things you might need so you do not have to go out in really cold weather including: Making sure you have a stock of food

If you need medication make sure you have a sufficient stock in the house If you have a prepayment energy meter top up your credit. Make sure you have a torch and know where it is in case of power cuts. Looking after your Neighbour! Check on older neighbours or relatives to make sure they're safe and well.

Make sure they're warm enough, especially at night, and have stocks of food and medicines so they don't need to go out during very cold weather.If your'e worried about a relative or an elderly neighbour, ring Cornwall Council or the Age UK helpline on 0800 00 99 66.

If you have a neighbour who struggles with their mobility and is unable to get out due to the slippery pavements, offer to go shopping for them to ensure they have enough basic food items in the house.If you have an immediate concerned for your neighbour, for example, they are not responding to your telephone calls or your knocks on the door and you are not expecting them to be out, call your local police station which will be able to gain access to check on them

Additional advice for the elderly: To keep warm and well during spells of cold weather: Have regular hot drinks and eat at least one hot meal a day if possible. Eating regularly helps keep energy levels up during winter. Keep as active in your home as possible. If possible, stay inside during a cold period particularly if you have heart or respiratory problems. Draw your curtains at dusk and keep

If you can't heat all the rooms you use, heat the living room during the day and the bedroom just before you go to bed. You can also use a hotwater bottle or electric blanket (but not both at the same time) to keep warm while you're in bed. Going out in icy weather Take extra care, wrap up warm and wear shoes with a good grip if you need to go outside

on cold days. Icy pavements and roads can be very slippery. In snow a pair of old socks over the soles of your shoes will improve grip or you can buy overshoes. The Met Office advises putting grit or cat litter on paths and driveways to lessen the risk of slipping. It adds that you should wait until the roads have been gritted if you're travelling by car.

CAB Aim to Stay in Saltash

s far as the Citizens' Advice Bureau is concerned a presence in Saltash is vital. Following concerns that they might be forced to leave the town and their premises be sold off by Cornwall Council, who are reluctant to pay the £15,000 to £20,000 per year to run it, the CAB had been asked to consider alternatives. It had been feared that Saltash might lose its CAB despite it being the second busiest bureau in Cornwall with a constant demand for appointments and high numbers attending presenting a variety of financial and other problems, many desperate.

Meanwhile government cuts had reduced the legal fees grant to the CAB causing a reduction of 'face to face' appointments to half a day on Fridays, though staff are available on other days. The CAB would have liked to take over the building if the right financial package could be put together, failing which they were asked to look at alternative venues. They the Guildhall included Library and Maurice Huggins Room but none offer the accommodation and privacy required.

The Mayor and Deputy Mayor, Councillors David Yates and Jean Dent, with Town Clerk Ray Lane met with Neil Calhoun of the CAB who confirmed that if necessary administration would move to Liskeard but it was considered vital that face to face appointments in Saltash would continue.

They understood however that Cornwall Council still wishes to sell the building in Belle Vue Road and the CAB would be asked to vacate it in early spring of 2014.

had it confirmed that Cornwall Council is carrying out a survey and valuation of the building. The Trouble with Kids

ecently I ventured into Saltash Community College.net to talk to sixth formers about Politics. Now as you know all teenagers are completely disinterested in anything other than computer games and music. Well at least, that's what the media will have you think, and certainly, it might be true, that they might spend a fair proportion of their spare time plugged into their iPods and glued to their computer screens.

They are not, however, disinterested in Politics. Just, I suggest, Politicians, during our talk described them as "liars", "greedy", "manipulative" and "in it for themselves'

So it was against that public perception that I started the discussion. What did surprise me is that against national trends Saltash pupils were prepared to consider voting. Using my Voter-a-meter 3000 (okay, I made that name up, it was in fact a large wooden box spilt in two with a Perspex side), I asked them to place a plastic ball in either the Yes or No side of the box to say if they could, would they vote, if there was an election tomorrow?

The result was about 50% said they would, which I have to say is very encouraging given national statistics which suggests it is much less with the younger generation. What's more, when we discussed issues such as voting age, MP's salaries and student fees, they very much had a view and were keen to express it.

Well because we now have a

fixed term Parliament, so if they don't vote in May 2015, they will not be able to vote again nationally until 2020 and! Statistically missing the first time to vote can also mean they are less likely to vote at all in later life. For a democrat like me that is very worrying that we might stop hearing the collective voice of first time voters

Well after an hour of the discussion which included some well informed and tough questions, I came away from the session really impressed with the level of knowledge and understanding young people had. I am certain this is helped by the positive ethos of the school, which encourages young people to think about their community and what they want the future to be.

Personally I always enjoy listening and learning from people, so I had a great time. You would need to ask your own child for their experience of the day. The good thing is I'm sure they will have one! Phil Hutty



At its annual general meeting there was discussion of a proposed joint South East Cornwall Chamber of Commerce, with the five local towns retaining their own chamber's identities while federating to ensure that this corner of the county pushes for its share of funding from a distant county authority in Truro. Chairman William Cotton promised more updates on this during the coming year.

A busy year in office has seen him and fellow committee members attending presentations on proposed developments at

Broadmoor and Tamar Village, Saltmill and making the views of business people known on each. He had attended town council and local regeneration group meetings and spoken out at them on issues of concern to local business.

The Chamber generally supported the free weekend scheme parking though expressing concern as to its abuse by those using it for commuting or shopping trips to Plymouth. Mr Cotton had carried out a survey of weekend parking for the STIG town improvement group.

The Chamber could only fully function representative body for local businesses and trades people if it received full support from those with businesses in the town. More active members were needed to attend meetings. The evening meeting times had been fixed for earlier and breakfast meetings had been organised in the hope that these might better suit members and prospective members but it was still a hard core of regular attendees on whom the work of representing local businesses

Mr. Cotton was unanimously re-elected Chairman with Mr. Peter Ryland as Vice-Chairman and Mr. Peter Dickerson as Secretary and Treasurer.

While Fore Street still presents a lively picture with relatively few empty shops compared with other local towns, members agreed that more active members needed to work with the Chamber in order to ensure that shops remained occupied and that the local economy could flourish in nationally difficult times for small shops and businesses
