## Pipes Played and Doves Soared as Peace **Garden was Opened**



garden where not only those from Saltash who lost their lives in past conflicts can be remembered but also hopes and prayers for a peaceful future can be offered has now been formally opened.

In the heart of Saltash, overlooked by the memorials to the fallen of two world wars, the autumnal afternoon sun was reflected off the bugles of the Devon and Somerset Fire and

Rescue Service Ceremonial Unit as the band played the last post and lament followed by the reveille.

In the presence of the Mayor and Mayoress of Saltash and Lord Mayor of Plymouth the Saltash Memorial Peace Garden was opened by Mr.Barry Brooking, grandson of Francis Brooking, one of the team of six Saltash Fireman killed in the Plymouth blitz 'Saltash paid a heavy price in two world wars as the 148 names on the memorial remind us, especially given that the town's population was only around 4000 in 1914 and 6000 in 1939', he reminded those present. He added that since 1945 British servicemen have continued to die on service each year except one, a total of sixteen thousand in the past seventy years. He himself had been luck to survive a post-war conflict when serving as a Royal Marine Commando 'Those whose names are on the memorial would have approved the Garden' he concluded.

A service of dedication was led by Reverend Jonathan Budd. President of Saltash Churches Together and prayers were offered by the Mayor's Chaplain the Reverend Michelle Parkman, The Mayor, Councillor Bill Phillips laid a wreath on the newly unveiled memorial as doves of peace were released from St. Nicholas Church by Miss Elizabeth Turner, and rose through a darkening November sky.

#### **Council Says No to Town Centre CCTV**

here will be no CCTV mounted in and around Saltash Fore Street, it appears, after the Town Council turned down a request for £16,000 'Section 106 Money' to subsidise the scheme

A facebook poll of local residents had shown 72% of respondents clearly favoured the scheme with just 21% against. However Councillors noted that only 74 replies had been received making it hardly representative of the town's populace of 17,000

Similarly a poll of Fore Street businesses showed 94% in favour of CCTV with only 6% against. Councillors queried, however, whether this might have been in response to a 'loaded' question with no financial consideration taken into account.

An unmanned CCTV system in a town such as Saltash is of limited value to the police, Inspector Julian Morris told the council as 'it does not pick up what we want to pick up'. It is better if it is manned by volunteers, at least at critical times such as Friday and Saturday evenings, as has been effectively practiced in Bude. The volunteers can zoom in on incidents and film is of evidential quality.

After prolonged discussion the Town Council decided by a majority vote that CCTV was not a good use of public funding under the present scheme.

Instead the Council is to consider all options as part of its duly to reduce crime and this could include paying for a PCSO if policing cuts eliminate them.

#### **Sector Inspector Tells Town of Fears for Further Police Cuts**

altash could lose its community police team and its popular police community support officers. Sector Inspector Julian Morris has told the town council before the Chancellor made his Autumn statement. However the town's police station seems secure, despite other local stations being marked for

While £58 million has already been shaved off Devon and Cornwall's police budget over the past five years the force was now awaiting news of further cuts planned. In what Inspector Morris described as a 'worst case scenario a 25% cut of £54 million might be implemented If so recruitment would cease and neighbourhood police teams would have to go. Chancellor George Osborne, against all predictions, made no further cuts to police budget in his subsequent statement these changes would not now appear necessary.

Instead reactive police response units would be based

such hubs had been set up at Liskeard and Bodmin. However Inspector Morris, supervises the South East Cornwall sector, advised that this had not worked well and it would be his intention to move response units to other towns and keep officers in Saltash as such a response unit.

Saltash police station is in line for refurbishment to keep it fit for purpose and is therefore not lined up for closure. In fact news reports of station closures were misleading, Inspector Morris reported.

While police estates are being downsized and Liskeard station is due for demolition another is due to be built possibly accommodating all three emergency services. Likewise stations closing at Looe and Torpoint are due to be replaced. Meanwhile Saltash station will continue to be staffed and provide a twentyfour hour response.

Local crime figures reported average around 58 per week, up

two per week on last year which Inspector Morris considers not too bad. However Councillor John Brady advised that when he had called the police 101 non-emergency number he had been told that there was a 45 -50 minute wait for a call to be taken and suggest that many crimes may go unreported by those unwilling to wait such times. Inspector Morris agreed the telephone response system was flawed.

Asked whether Saltash might pay for its own PCSO Inspector Morris agreed that this was a possibility and that St. Austell had previously done

With 80% of the police budget going on staffing costs cutbacks further seem inevitable and Saltash Town Council, at Inspector Morris' suggestion, agreed to lobby MP's and others as to minimising further cuts and to seek to retain the reassuring sight of neighbourhood police team and PCSO's in the town.

Local leisure services in Cornwall, including Saltash's Leisure Centre, are likely to be disposed of by Cornwall Council as part of its cost cutting plans.

Tempus Leisure, currently run the Saltash Leisure Centre, have told the Town Council that there would seem to be two alternatives, to sell off leisure centres such as Saltash individually or sell all in Cornwall as a package deal. After discussion the Town Council declined to express a preference and noted the



Christmases during the war years were celebrated very much in the spirit of 'making do' despite increasing shortages making this increasingly harder and it is now interesting to look back at how families managed to survive and enjoy wartime Christmases with so little of what we consider vital to the festive season.

Although preparations for food rationing began almost immediately on the outbreak of war in September 1939 they were not put into effect until January 1940. Christmas in 1939 could therefore be celebrated as in peacetime with as many good things as could be afforded. The







amily members of the two Saltash Firemen who were ≺ killed in the Plymouth blitz in 1941 and whose names were omitted from the St. Stephens war memorial have come forward following an article appearing in your 'Saltash Observer' and elsewhere

Six Saltash firemen died as they travelled to render aid in the height of the firestorm that rained on Plymouth. Their names, together with that of a Saltash boy scout who lost his life fighting the Saltash blitz, appear on the memorial by St. Nicholas and St. Faith Church. However only four names appear on St. Stephens's war memorial.

Subsequent to the article in your November 'Observer' family members of the other two have come forward and several were able to accept invitations to the opening of the Saltash Memorial Peace Garden described elsewhere in this month's 'Observer

Linda Dodwell, who now lives in Harrowbarrow, was the niece of Leslie Tibbs, one of the two missing names. 'I would be delighted if he could be included with those colleagues who died with him', she told the Observer.

The other missing name, Bernard Jasper,

represented by his nephew Robert Spraggs who came to the garden opening with his wife Hazel, they both being now living in Plymouth. Also present was Bernard's cousin Maurice Eglington of Saltash. Another nephew and niece, Nicholas Bernard Jasper of Gloucestershire and Mollie Morgan of Plymouth, who was away at the time, were unable to attend. The Jasper family too would like to see their relative commemorated at St. Stephens.

## **Fire Cadet Raising Funds** for Life Saving Defibrillator



The latest in hi-tech equipment capable of saving lives of heart attack victims could be purchased for Saltash and installed for emergency use in the heart of the town if a 13 year old local boy is successful in his fund raising

Jack Phelan, as well as being a carer for his disabled mother, has had a life interest in caring for others, in saving lives, and in the emergency services. He is a Saltash fire cadet and has been learning and practicing life support skills, becoming involved in Emergency Line Equipment Trust (FLEET)

Jack's ambition in life now is to acquire a public access defibrillator. Sudden cardiac arrest is a major killer and only 5% of victims will survive as the only effective treatment is defibrillation, where an electric shock is passed across the heart - but this must be applied very soon to be successful.

Such equipment installed, Jack suggests, by the fire station near the centre of the town, could save local lives and he has already collected pounds several hundred towards the total cost of £1,000 plus £2,000 for a cabinet. His latest fundraising plan was for a table-top sale in Fore Street at the Saltash Christmas Festival Saturday.
