

Scouts Secure Funding to Transform HQ

he 2nd Saltash Scout Group is celebrating after being awarded £100,000 Cornwall Council's from Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) fund. This much-needed funding will finally allow the group to finish their two-storey Scout HQ at Latchbrook, as well as refurbish the games court and surrounding green park space.

This is one of two major grants allocated to Saltash in the fourth round of CIL funding. with Saltash Town Council also receiving £100,000 towards a new play area and sensory gardens at Jubilee Green. The CIL Fund, launched in 2020, has provided over £5.7 million to comprojects munity across Cornwall. Applicants had to show their projects met local needs and would tackle the impact of development. For the Scouts, the proximity of the



Latchbrook HQ to the new housing development at Treledan underscored the growing need for improved facilities in the area.

Work on the building stalled nearly a decade ago when funds ran out, and rising construction costs after the Covid-19 pandemic compounded the challenges. It is thanks to the vision



shop-ready area, complete with a kitchen and bathroom, which will be available for hire.

Andrew Jewell shared the group's excitement: "We're relieved to have secured this funding, and I'm delighted to confirm that work will begin in the first quarter of next year. This project has been a long time coming, and we can't wait to see it take shape." The Scouts are now calling on

local tradespeople, from plasterers to electricians, to help get the job done within the next 12 months. Keith encouraged locals to step forward: "We are keen to keep to our local Saltash community, so anyone who would like to find out more, please get in touch."

Cornwall Council will launch the next round of CIL funding in 2026.



river, so this work is imperative to continue to secure the carpark and footpath. They are already working closely with Saltash Town Council and Cornwall Council Maritime Department to mitigate that works consider ferry movements the pedestrians and boat users.

Information of these works will be put into public areas and slipway for residents and visitors.

Discussions are being had between various organisations and Highways England regarding the tunnel closure. From August 2025 for approximately five months, which is the switch off time, the tunnel and bridge will no longer operate on a tidal flow basis. Fixed lanes will be in operation with clear directions for each lane: there will be weekly updates on journey times which will be communicated as they will be working with 3 data sets which are Plymouth, Tamar Bridge and Tunnel this will mean the loss of the centre lane of the tunnel. During these works wide loads will not be able to use the Tamar Bridge.

Building Bridges, Forging Legacy: David List Retires

fter 27 years at the helm of Tamar General Crossings, Manager David List has retired, leaving a legacy of innovation and teamwork. From overseeing the groundbreaking strengthening and widening of the Tamar Bridge to managing the Torpoint Ferry replacement programme, David's tenure has been marked by significant engineering achievements, with the bridge and ferries reliably serving up to 18 million

vehicles annually. David's retirement marks the end of an era for both Tamar Crossings and the wider bridge engineering community. A key figure in his field, he served as an active member of the UK Bridge Owners Forum and as one of two European representatives on the International Cable Supported Bridge Operators

Association A special farewell event at the Tamar Bridge in December brought together colleagues, councillors, and represenfrom tatives partner organisations. Joint Committee Chair Cllr. Martin Worth thanked David for his "wonderful years of service," and staff presented him with a coat rack featuring a bolt from the Tamar Bridge.

David's engineering career began with a first-class degree from Nottingham University at the age of 20. He honed his expertise through work on major infrastructure projects in Redditch and Hong Kong

before joining Tamar Crossings in 1997. During his first years, he played a pivotal role in keeping the Bridge operational during the strengthening and widening project - a global first, as the project was completed while the Bridge remained open to live traffic. This remarkable feat resulted in just 2% of traffic volume being lost during the works, earning the project multiple

awards. In his speech, David highlighted the unique nature of the infrastructure he managed, noting that the Torpoint Ferry is the largest chain ferry in the world. Reflecting on his time at Tamar Crossings, David expressed pride in building a strong, positive organisational culture. "What I'll miss most is the people - my team and the partners I've worked with over the years. While I'll no longer cross the Bridge for work, Tamar Crossings will always hold a special place in my heart."

I would like to thank all those involved, with a special mention to Chamber member Hilary Frank, who worked tirelessly to ensure that at least some elements of the event could take place.

look forward to continuing to help the people of Saltash and surrounding areas with all their holiday requirements



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

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

Gold & Gaps Every year in December, Japan chooses a Kanji of the Year. This tradition sees people voting for a single kanji (a character used in Japanese writing) that sums up the past twelve months. For 2024, the kanji 金, meaning 'gold' or 'money', out on top. came It recognised Japanese athletes bringing home gold medals from the Paris Olympics but also reflected ongoing political financial troubles. Wherever you look, money or the lack of it - seems to be

a golden thread tying events together. Across the world, money dominated political headlines in 2024. Consider Elon Musk's involvement in the US elections and his rumoured donations to Reform UK. Political donations from business leaders are nothing new here, though: two-thirds of all political donations in 2023 came from just 19 individuals. Businessman Frank Hester alone has donated over £20 million to the Conservative Party since 2023. It's enough to make you wonder whether democracy is for sale While money flows into the

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coffers of political parties, local government faces a starkly different financial picture after years of chronic underfunding by successive governments. Cuts aimed at closing the budget gap are already biting: Cornwall Council announced 100 redundancies in the run-up to Christmas particularly cruel blow given the timing - and is planning to close Adult Education centres in seven Cornish towns, including Saltash. I've joined Saltash Town Council in protesting against the move, but the signs for avoiding this outcome are not encouraging.

Looking forward, there is some hope for increased income. From April 2025, Cornwall Council will be able to double council tax on second homes, thanks to new powers under the 2023 Levelling-up and Regeneration Act, which could generate an extra £25 million. It may also help address our housing crisis, freeing up homes for local families and bringing life back to 'ghost villages' The financial strain on

Cornwall Council will continue to grow, however, with social care costs and school transport expenses heaping additional pressure on the budget. And the unexpected Employer National Insurance increase announced in the 2024 Autumn budget is projected to cost Cornwall Council an extra £2 million a year. Even with income from council

tax and second-home premiums we're still looking at a gap of over £9 million.

So, while 金 may have been Japan's kanji for 2024, it could just as easily symbolise the financial balancing acts ahead for Cornwall in 2025. We'll need to face challenges and opportunities with the same focus and determination as athletes striving for medals if we want to deliver golden

support its education and engagement programme. The Centre, which has now been open for five years, has a range of opportunities for people to get involved. The small team of valued and dedicated volunteer Bridge Ambassadors are central to the day to day running of the Visitor and Learning Centre. The team operate a flexible approach - people can volunteer weekly if they prefer, or they can dip in and out to fit around their personal lives.

Entry to the Centre is free of charge and it is open from 10am to 4pm every day. The Ambassador position has various roles within it - Bridge Guides give guided tours, Welcome Hosts welcome groups for tours and school workshops, and Research and Archive Volunteers find out more about the histories of the bridges and the surrounding areas.

Introductory talks are led by volunteers on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings during the winter months. Guided tours onto the bridge are delivered to groups all year round. Public anchorage tours are popular, and volunteers deliver these too. All tours receive positive feedback from the public and are a great way to connect people to the heritage of the Tamar Bridge and Brunel's Royal Albert Bridge. What's it like for volunteers?

According to the annual survey results from 2024, 100% of volunteers would recommend volunteering at Bridging the Tamar to other people.

Storm Darragh Disrupted Festival

But the Spirt of Christmas Shone Through

The bitter blast of Storm Darragh deprived Saltash of its eagerly awaited Christmas Festival, an event that welcomes the season of joy to the town each year. Yet the children of Saltash were determined not to miss the chance to celebrate and show off the Christmas lanterns they had created with such pride at workshops in the town's schools.



The Lantern Parade is traditionally a magnificent climax to a day that sees Fore Street lined with stalls, and the crowds come to share the seasonal spirit and support the traders. This year, sadly the small group of volunteers who had spent months working to organise a day of community fun had to take the hard decision to cancel as forecasts warned of near hurricane force winds that could endanger life as well as property. The service was led by Simon Thomas of Saltash Redeemer Church, and featured rousing carol singing accompanied by the Redeemer Church band. The congregation's favourite was clearly the moment when the church lights were dimmed, and illuminated by their lanterns, the children joined together to sing O Little Town of Bethlehem Adding to the festive spirit,

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Sustainable Saltash

A regular column on changes Saltash residents are making to confront climate and ecological breakdown

efore we know where we are, Christmas will be upon us and we will be looking forward to those few days that signify rest and celebration in the short days of winter. Almost before the last mince pie has been eaten, many of us turn our thoughts to New Year, with its resolutions and its high street sales. Clothing retailers in particular have always seen an uplift, but the number of items which end up discarded or unused has been very high in recent decades.

There are signs of change Rising costs and constrained finances have coupled with growing awareness of the harm caused by the fashion industry. So how to face the New Year with head held high?

It is easily found online now and remains startlingly relevant. It is clear see how it nurtured

thriftiness in a nation that needed it. Sounding familiar? Some of the chapters focus on caring for clothes so they last longer (wear old things when you are just around the house, keep washing to a minimum, fold and hang properly). The remainder is dedicated to visible and invisible repairs and repurposing clothes. It is clear that the assumed level of knowledge is low, and the advice given is step-by-step. Now to apply this in the

A Stitch Back in Time

altash has a rich history - and in one form or other has been duly recorded - mainly in history books and periodicals of reliable repute.

That said, Saltash also boasts an astonishing historic pictorial reflection chronicled in embroideries going back 2000 years, which is exhibited in the Long Room of the Saltash Guildhall.


The Chronicles of Saltash's bold prehistories to the modern day are quite extraordinary and were the conceptional brain child of Andrew Tritton a past resident of Saltash.

Embroideries

Andrew's love of embroidery has been well documented and goes back to his time serving in the Royal Navy to pass away the time at sea. Andrew began his idea of the

Saltash Chronicles back in 2012 when he spent a year producing conceptual 2/3 size embroidered panel to present to various artisan groups and Saltash Town Council to see what interest there would be and to indeed to attract the funding needed to further develop his idea.

The Saltash Chronicles

into a beautiful and intriguing work of outstanding historic craftsmanship.

The hanging Chronicles are trebly spaced along the whole length of the West wall of the Long Room - and are made of linen from Scotland and the majority of the embroidery wools are from Bayeux Broderie in France.

Andrew was delighted that members of the local community and organisations, together with children from local schools and youth groups designed the pictures, emblems and logos for the borders and quarters.

By 2016 there were 27 embroidered panels, which took up to 500 hours each to complete, they were all sewn together to produce a colourful panorama and over 100 feet in length at that time – of which more panels and footage has since been added.

The embroideries were first exhibited at the Saltash Baptist Church, but more recently transferred to the Saltash Guildhall - the project received initial part funding from the Saltash Town Council, Caradon Area Community Fund and many generous donations from the public

Embroidered Panels

The embroidered panels reflects periods in Saltash's history starting with (prehistory) Esse/ The Ash tree over the water and a supporting booklet gives a more detailed

history of events depicted within the panels. More panels record early times including - the Stoneage, the Romans, the Anglo Saxons, the Battle of Hastings (1066) and of the Cornish rebellion of 1070 caused by William the Conqueror who ordered construction of castles in the area - (The Manor of Trematon (Trematon Castle) by

William's half-brother Robert the Count of Mortain, being one of them.) St Stephens Church

majestically features, built by ceded Richard de Valletort when he founded a Borough in the vicinity of Trematon Castle. The revival of the tin mining

industry after the succession of Henry 11 in 1154 resulted in Saltash developing as a major port exporting tin which is so beautifully sewn into the chronicles

New Saltash Borough, **Chapel and Market Place** Established

Around 1190 de Valletort established a new Borough on what is now recognisable as the Saltash Waterside - which eventually resulted in the building of a chapel we now celebrate as St Nicholas and St Faith Church, and a nearby Market square was also part of de Valletort's work.

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
