From the moment the community wall project reached the final stage in Peoples Jubilee Millions Big Lottery Voting process the Team and in particular the K3 Young People were their determination to ensure we had an excellent chance of

With only four weeks of campaigning and strict financial guidelines on advertising the campaign had to be dynamic. Virtually every household in Saltash delivered a flyer was outlining the voting process but of course without the vital phone number, that , would only be released at 9:00 am on the day of the voting by the Big Lottery and in that mornings edition of the Daily Mirror.

The seven primary schools in and around Saltash were delivered a bookmark for every pupil to put into their reading bags and to encourage the community to be involved from the outset

Posters were put up around the towns shops including a giant six foot by six foot poster in Saltash Town. Local groups who wanted the wall in the first place were contacted to attend the filming session for the two and a half minute slot be shown on the Westcountry News on 29th

A copy of the paper was secured at 05:50 am from McColls in Fore Street and taken to local printers Mr Sticker who produced 5000 'flyers' containing the all important number. There on in, it was down to the K3 Community Team of volunteers to get the message to the all important supporters and voters.

Workers, The Management Committee, Young People, Council Employees and our local emailed, texed, or messages on facebook to their friends and family to get as many voters as possible. The local supermarkets, car parks health centres, leisure and sports centre, Pubs, employers car parks and schools as well

supporters either posted as houses were then targeted


with leaflet drops from 0715 right up to 10 pm. A short but intense campaign and the wonderful Cornish People and other equally important

ferry daily to travel to school or work, as a special event/ to shop in Plymouth. to visit family or friends, go to the cinema, or perhaps for a special occasion, your personal recollections are welcomed.

An oral history archive is being collated by Stephanie Norgaard who has recently graduated with a BA specialising in creating sound collages. Steph will be happy to visit and record individual memories in the home or wherever convenient by appointment.

She told The Observer: "History books don't tell us everything about the past. All too often the stories of ordinary people and their everyday lives are lost. All memories are a mixture of facts and opinions and both are important when future generations piece together the local history of their area. I hope that the archive will contain reminiscences, personal experiences and

eve-witness accounts of the final decades in the life of the ferry. I hope to capture the atmosphere of the traffic on the river and the bustling life of Waterside, a unique part of Saltash."

#### "Can Do" Award

Cornwall Council has been praised as a "Can Do" Council which is acting to protect frontline services and local taxpayers by Local Government Secretary Eric Pickles, (three councils have been nominated Adur, Bury and Cornwall), he says "they are protecting the services their community's value with creative thinking'

As a taxpayer living in Saltash you may very well ask what does that mean to me? Library hours being reduced by 9.5 hours per week, Adult Care being cut by 40% over four years, winter services (grit bins) being reduced by devolving their use to the Town Council, Grass cutting reduced, car parking charges increased, to name just a few things that we as residents are suffering.But we must look a the grander scheme of things where Cornwall Council is being asked by the Government to reduce its spending by £170 million over the next four years and no matter how much savings we make with the reduction of staff – front line services are going to be affected councils, I will let you be the

The Council's proactive approach to meeting the financial challenges it faces as a result of reductions in Government funding and the greater focus on efficiency and stronger financial management has also helped the authority to save an additional £7.190 million over the past twelve months. This means that Cornwall is in a much stronger position than most other councils to deal with the impact of further funding without the need to cut more services and can also now look at the possibility of investing more capital in key projects to deliver growth and

#### Superfast Broadband

One of the projects that wer being promised by Carolyn Rule (the then portfolio holder for Economy) was that the superfast broadband to be rolled out first in the eastern region of the county this has now been rescinded the reason is as follows which has come from Nigel Ashcroft, Director of Superfast Cornwall: "Under EU state aid guidelines BT cannot receive public funding for areas that already have nex generation broadband services available as this would distort competition. Saltash is the only area of Cornwall where Virgin Media has cable footprint and so has their 50Mbps service is available. Hence Saltash has always been outside the scope of the Cornwall project. However Openreach recently announced it would enable Saltash for SFBB as part of their business as usual national programme and do so without using any public

The way I now understand the situation is that Saltash will be getting the Superfast BB with BT at the autumn of 2012 instead of the spring of 2012

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## Castle venue for Festival of Writers and Reader!

he location for Saltash Bookshelf's first Literary festival, a castle overlooking the twisting Tamar river, was 'non-pareil' – beyond compare, declared the Right Honourable Ann Widdecombe, one of a number of guest speakers who entertained a packed house of booklovers. A lady with local roots, her grandfather having been a baker in Saltash, Ms Widdecombe told the Saltash Observer that she had enjoyed thoroughly the event at Pentillie Castle, it had been "tremendous fun, the questions wide ranging and I hope they invite me again."

It had always been her ambition to be a known novelist, she had told her audience, having written her first book aged ten and a full length novel at 18. By the time she left university however, he other love of life, politics had taken over, and it was only later in life that she began to write in

Mary's finest local art works.

The boisterous era of Nelson was recalled when Julian Stockwin gave his talk, launching his latest seafaring epic. "There is a moment when the sea reaches out and touches you" he told his enthralled audience. "It did for me, and it did for my hero Thomas Kydd." Drawing on

earnest and completed "An Act of Treachery" described as "the book I always intended to write."

The researching and writing up of local history had been the subject of the first talk by well known Plymouth writer and artist Chris Robinson. Having been brought up on comics he was always keen to ensure his books were fully illustrated and he fascinated his audience by projecting some of the many paintings, prints and photographs he had discovered in his research, particularly for his latest book, a history of the three hundred year rise and fall of Devonport. He accompanied the pictures with a vivid description of Devonport and Plymouth in more rumbustious days.

During a prolonged lunch break guests could enjoy an excellent buffet meal in a marquee or on the terrace with its spectacular river views. There was time to walk off the lunch through the gardens down to the boathouse or even along the lime tree walk past the ice house to the Gothic mausoleum.

The lunch break also allowed the opportunity to mingle with special guests Virginia Spiers and Mary Martin. These Tamar Valley born sisters had recently combined their talents, Virginia being a 'Guardian' country columnist and Mary a renowned and much sought after artist, to produce a book 'Silver River.' This beautifully produced volume, evocative of the Tamar past and present includes many of

his own experience, sent away to HMS Indefatigable aged 14, his latest is the twelfth book in a sage designed to portray the adventurous life of a boy sailor of Nelson's navy thought his career up to Admiral of the blue. He made clear through his enthusiastic talk to his audience that he follows his own advice to them in "writing the book you

yourself want to read."

A detective crime series set around her home town of St Ives had been suggested by her publisher to Debby Fowler, the afternoon's final guest speaker. The result is the highly successful and popular Felicity Paradise series of which six books were now available.

Felicity is not based on herself, Mrs Fowler replied to a question, being vounger. more confident and feisty, though her background is similar to the author's own. St Ives she considered an ideal setting with its contrast of artists and artisans, fisherfolk and visitors. She was anxious however not to put off visitors by creating a 'Midsummer Murders' scenario of a murder rate exceeding Chicago in the gangster era.

A "St Ives boy" in the audience did confirm that in her books "all crimes are committed by incomers."

The day proved an undoubted success enjoyed by all and gratitude was expressed to Jill Male of "Saltash Bookshelf" for organising it as part of independent booksellers' week. The venue was ideal,

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
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#### **Blitz 70 Years Anniversary** Week

In place of standard History lessons Key Stage 3 students were able to access a range of material and resources to research and produce their own reflective Classes and year groups were able to mix throughout the History Block, which was transformed into a Blitz-style zone with striking and imaginative displays and eye-catching war-time posters. Students were able to independently use resources from an extensive bank, including primary sources and accounts, and even an exciting range of artefacts kindly supplied by Truro Museum.

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#### Bridge repaint and restoration is historic performance

The long promised renovation of the Royal Albert Bridge to ensure its future after one and a half centuries of constant usage is at last under way.



A brief ceremony on the St Budeaux side of the Tamar attended by the Mayor and Mayoress of Saltash Colin and Marilyn Oakes heralded in a two year project.

As part of the project all of the paint put on since the original coating in the 1850's is to be stripped off back to the bare metal. It will be

replaced by a long lasting paint cover as now used on the Forth Railway Bridge in Scotland and which ensures that "painting the Forth Bridge" is no longer a synonym for a never ending task. Indeed the company involved on the Royal Albert Bridge, Taziker Industrial is also involved in works on the Forth Road Bridge

It was suggested that the bridge should be repainted

in its original colour of offwhite, the original paint having been discovered during experiments on the paintwork. However, it was decided that this would quickly deteriorate and look shabby so the new paintwork



present "battleship grey."

Two small squares of the original paint cover will be preserved for historic reasons.

As well as repainting there be considerable restructuring. The cross girders will be repaired, much other steel work replaced, and some of the steelwork added during the twentieth century



will be removed to bring the design more in keeping with Brunel's original.

Around ten million pounds and two million man hours will go into ensuring a bridge fit for the twenty-first century providing rail connections into Cornwall for decades to come.

Residents Waterside and Lower Fore Street are assured that the encapsulation of the sector being worked upon will prevent debris falling into streets and residences below.

Workmen will be looking out for the gold rivet supposedly hidden somewhere it the structure by Brunel and covered in paint ever since. We are assured however that the "gold rivet" myth is a popular one used especially among seamen anxious to entice women into the depths of their ships. Still there is no harm in looking.

#### James is on a Mission



Saltash School 'Old Boy' Receives a Boost from Today's Pupils on His Fundraising Crusade to Help Fight Blindness'

Former Saltash.net pupil, 19 year old James Smale, is on a mission to raise funds to help find a cure for Retinitis Pigmentosa because his Mother's twin sister is losing her sight due to the little known, yet potentially devastating condition.

52 year old Sheila Royle, who was a pupil at Saltash School herself in the 1970s, now lives in Poulton-le-Fylde. Lancashire. She is working hard to live with her increasing sight loss and along with husband David and family, continues to run her estate agency business - despite being registered as legally blind.

James says that his entire family has been inspired by Sheila's courage:

"Her sight is diminishing because the light receiving cells on the retinas at the back of her eyes are dying off. There is no cure as yet but it is frustrating because research shows that a cure for the condition is getting much closer. More research is needed but that is expensive and unfortunately RP is not a high profile charity so they struggle terribly to raise funds.

On July 16th this year James is taking part in a challenge event arranged by the British Retinitis Pigmentosa (RP) Society. His week long trek across the rough terrain of Iceland is one of many 'RP Fighting Blindness' challenge

events that aim to raise funds for research into RP.

On Monday (June 6, 2011) James, who aims to become a teacher, returned to his old school where he was presented with a £239.31 cheque by Headteacher Mrs Isobel Bryce

"We are pleased to be able to support James' fundraising efforts and we all wish him the very best of luck. James has promised to return to tell pupils all about his trek and the work of the RP Society.'

The school has also pledged to donate 50% of the proceeds from a forthcoming end of term talent show." James said:

"I would like to thank Mrs Bryce, the staff and pupils most sincerely for their support. I am (nervously) looking forward to telling them all about the Iceland Trek at an assembly when I return.'

arks ascended, swallows dived and sedge warblers warbled lustily as a group of would-be wild flower spotters were led around Churchtown Farm wildlife reserve by botanist Ian

As well as discovering a number of the reserves two hundred or so flower species in the late Spring sunshine walkers admired a number of butterflies including the exotic looking marbled white.

The variety of habitats on the reserve ensures a varied mixture of plant life. In the marshland Ian distinguished fools' watercress from true watercress and discovered hedge mustard, swinecress, bog stitchwort and water pepper – with its strong peppery taste. Not to be tasted were the poisonous hemlock, water dropwort and woody nightshade.

meadowlands produced nipplewort, fumitory and speedwell while hedge bedstraw hid in the hedges and stinking iris (the "roast beef plant") flourished in the woodland.

Among evocatively named wild plants discovered were fleabane, bladder campion, birds' foot trefoil, fiddle dock, cut leafed cranesbill and goatsbeard, otherwise known as Jack Go To Bed at Noon.

The walk was well attended and was one of the variously themed monthly guided walks organised by the Friends of Churchtown Farm.

#### Ann Widdecombe speaks of Politics, "Strictly" and her Saltash Roots

Saltash Baker's granddaughter is renowned as a cabinet minister in the Thatcher government but even better known as a dazzling contestant in television's top rating "Strictly come Dancing!

No marks for guessing the Right Honourable Ann Widdecombe, though many have been unfamiliar with her Saltash roots. Saltash Observer reporter Martin Lister took the opportunity to talk with her when she attended the recent Literary Festival at Pentillie Castle organised 'Saltash by Bookshelf's' Jill Male.

"We have traced our family back to the Saltash of the 1750's," she told Martin. "My grandfather Charlie had a bakery in the Town and my father was born in Saltash where I still have family." Her mother was a "St Budeaux maid" who ran a sweet shop in Victoria Road living, it was discovered in the same road as reporter Martin's own mother.

Ann herself however was brought up "everywhere" being in a service family. She came back to the West Country to fight David Owen for the Devonport seat in 1983 before being elected at Maidstone and

Before that her first love was writing. Her first book 'Forest Trek' was written at the age of ten and her first novel set in Ancient Rome, at eighteen.

When her other love of Politics took over her life, late night sittings in the Commons left little time for writing. The Labour landslide of 1997 saw her move from Home Office to Back Bencher and the resulting time available led to her writing 'The Clematis Tree,' a Times bestseller.

She now has a number of best sellers to her name but in each case starts with only a general idea of where to end and in each book, she declares "One of the central characters has taken me by surprise. When readers tell me "I knew what was going to happen," I have to reply, "that's more than I did," she claims.

Her political heroes are Wilberforce and Churchill, each of whom fought for their beliefs in the face of public indifference and apathy. In the one instance the public had accepted slavery as inevitable, in the other appeasement to Hitler appeared equally inevitable as to alternative to war.
