

a major topic in the coming months as the government has invited proposals for the largest restructuring of local government in over 50 years,

promising to devolve powers and funding from Whitehall. The developments will have a crucial impact on us in South East Cornwall.

Although Anna Gelderd MP, along with all other Cornish MPs, endorsed the recent Cornish Democracy report advocating for Cornish devolution, her article in the last issue of the Saltash

Observer appeared to favour Cornwall as part of an authority including Devon, Torbay and Plymouth. But experience shows that when Cornwall is grouped with Devon, power and funding shift eastward. This has already happened with policing and water services, which are both based in Exeter. Much of our healthcare is already in Plymouth, and unless you walk over the bridge, vou have to pay to access them, either through bridge tolls, train fares or bus tickets. A Devonwall mayor and strategic authority would almost certainly operate from Devon, further drawing services away from South East Cornwall.

Devonwall would not be devolution. It would be a loss of control that threatens our economy, services, identity and language.

So, what is the alternative? The Devolution for Cornwall report, produced by the Institute of Cornish Studies and endorsed by Cornwall's 6 MPs, sets out a clear and reasoned vision of a devolved Cornwall with the power and funding to make its own decisions. With proper devolution,

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Cornwall could take control of planning to ensure that housing developments serve local needs rather than external interests. South East Cornwall could become an economic zone, with targeted projects to attract businesses and create jobs. Crucially, we could engage from a position of strength rather than dependency, making the case for fairer funding that would allow for greater investment in our communities, including the abolition of tolls on the Tamar Crossings. By the 10th January dead-

line, the government had received 17 proposals for local government mergers. At the beginning of February, Deputy Prime Minister Angela Rayner announced the six areas selected for the priority devolution programme, with the 'Devonwall' proposal notably not among them.

Cornwall is not just another administrative county. We hold protected national minority status under the Council of Europe's Framework Convention. On the same day the priority devolution areas were announced, the Deputy Prime Minister spoke in the

House of Commons, reaffirming her recognition of Cornwall's national minority status and committing to ensuring that devolution will be shaped with the people of Cornwall, not imposed on us. We welcome her pledge to work with Cornwall to deliver meaningful devolution.

To be clear, this is not about cutting ourselves off from Plymouth or Devon. It is about securing the power to shape our own future, because no one understands the needs of our fishermen, farmers, ageing pop-

better than the people who live and work here. The River Tamar has marked Cornwall's boundary for over a thousand years. Our culture is distinct, our identity unique, and our history one of resilience. Cornwall has fiercely rejected past attempts to weaken our heritage. We must reject this one. too. Devonwall is a dangerous illusion.

Chamber Chairman Peter Ryland Keeping Us Updated

t the February Chamber meeting, we discussed matters as diverse as retail, manufacturing, highways and even Christmas! Yes, Christmas, because planning for the festivities starts now. A recent meeting between Chamber members and the Town Council has resulted in a decision to deliver the lights switch-on and the Christmas Festival on separate days. The Chamber will support the Town Council in organising the switch-on event, while continuing to run the Festival, as it has for many years. It was felt this would be the best approach for residents and traders.

A concern was raised about the lack of employment space in Saltash, with one Chamber member struggling to find suitable premises to expand their business. Concerns were also raised about the traffic initiative at the mouth of Gilston Road, as drivers still attempt to turn right when exiting, which may reduce its effectiveness during peak times.

Representing the Chamber, I've been working on the Town Team, alongside town and Cornwall councillors and representatives from

Community Enterprises PL12, to implement solutions to boost footfall into the town centre. One key outcome of our consultation last spring is the launch of a monthly street market on the third Saturday of each month. The first will take place on 15th March in the area outside Superdrug and The Original Factory Shop, offering a range of goods, including cakes, chutneys and eggs.

Meanwhile, Town Team has appointed contractors to deliver improvements on Fore Street, including new planters and better signage. Cornwall Highways will also be addressing uneven pavements and road signs, making the town centre a safer, more inviting place to visit. It's not often I get excited,

but with so much happening in Saltash, I can't help but feel optimistic. With fresh initiatives, community-driven events and long-overdue improvements, now is the time to get involved, shop local, and make the most of all that's happening in our town.

Cornwall Council Investment Secures Future of Saltash Leisure Centre

S altash Leisure Centre is set to undergo a major transformation into Cornwall's first multi-purpose community hub, thanks to a £1.88 million investment by Cornwall Council. This pioneering pilot project will bring a broad range of health and wellbeing services under one roof, keeping the swimming pool and improving the changing rooms.

In 2021, when the leisure centre faced the threat of closure, residents and sports clubs rallied to demonstrate that it was much more than just a recreational venue. Their determined campaign helped reverse the closure plans, and since then Cornwall and town councillors have actively supported GLL, the not-for-profit social enterprise contracted by Cornwall Council to operate the centre. GLL has delivered a range of improvements, including expanded fitness programmes and the introduction of a popular café serving local food and Senior Citizens' meal deals. The increased use by schools, clubs and the general public has underscored local commitment, and paved the way for this substantial investment.

A key element of the redevelopment is the reinstatement of

the registrar service in Saltash. Under the plan, a dedicated registrar will operate from the centre one day a week to handle birth, marriage and death registrations. Although there won't be a dedicated ceremony room, the centre will be the base for a team that will handle ceremonies in the area. A new Safe and Well Hub will also be set up in the centre, creating a shared space where a range of services and organisations can work together in a coordinated way. The hub will feature meeting rooms and drop-in facilities for Cornwall Council, making it easier for the Saltash community to access services.

James Curry, GLL's Head of Service in Cornwall, said: "We're very grateful for the continued local support and delighted to be working with our key partner, Cornwall Council, on this exciting new development. This model is the first of its kind in Cornwall and will give Saltash Leisure Centre a new lease of life."

Work to modernise the changing rooms and enhance the health and fitness areas is scheduled to begin in late spring. The project will be carried out in phases to minimise disruption, and the leisure centre will remain fully operational throughout the transformation.





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
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

To be able to continue to preserve and maintain services for the community of Saltash it is necessary to increase your Council Tax for 2025/2026 by 11%.

This equates to £27.34 per year which is just 53 pence per week for a typical Band D property.

The larger portion of your Council Tax is set by Cornwall Council, Devon and Cornwall Police, and Adult Social Care.

The Saltash Town Council portion of council tax is used to support the community in many ways.

Here are just a few examples of how your Saltash portion of council tax money has been reinvested in the community during 2023-2024:

- £59,069 for professional youth work commissioning
- £25,000 for Community Chest and Festival funds
- £20,000 for Saltash Play Park upgrades
- £4,726 for Saltash Youth Network
- Kitchen refurbishment at Isambard House for venue hire purposes
- **Devolution of assets, including Victoria Gardens**
- Installation of new stone memorial benches
- Grounds maintenance and floral display management
- Refurbishment of library windows
- Christmas lighting display installation
- St Stephens Churchyard upkeep
- Organisation of civic events and parades
- Tree planting initiatives
- Maintenance and management of public conveniences
- Library services provision
- Street furniture installation and maintenance
- Allotment management and development

Funding Streams

The Town Council has been successful in securing various funding during the year 2023-2024.

Funds have been received from Town Vitality (Working in partnership with Town Team), Cornwall Council's Community Infrastructure Fund, and Community Levelling Up, to be able to start reinvesting into the community.



(who embarrassed me by orally awarding me an accolade for which I do not qualify) nevertheless gave me an idea for this month's meanderings, and led me into memories of the thirty five years which preceded my fifty years in fair Esse. Not that it meant anything to me at the time, but the changes to our health system wrought by Clem Attlee's government after World War 2 very much impacted on my working class inner city Manchester family. Before the NHS came on the scene my father paid into something called the Hospital Saturday Fund. Our GP was a Scot. My mother and I would be called into his room, where he would be smoking his Capstan full strength cigarettes and sipping from a generous glass of whisky. Those were different days. Mum used to take me regularly to the eve hospital, as I had been born with a squint. Just after the NHS came on the scene I was introduced to the dentist for the first time – a jolly little bald German Jew who had escaped Hitler just before the war. He was nice. He extracted all of my parents' teeth and replaced them with false ones. That's what working class adults did in Moss Side in those days - waited until their teeth were rotten! I also experienced surgery for the first time when my tonsils were removed. I don't recall that with any pleasure. One of my brothers

had poliomyelitis (he survived) and that was a dreadful time. I have never forgotten the

winter of 1947. Our house was a two up two down terrace with walls of single brick thickness, plus mini kitchen/scullery, outside loo, bomb shelter, coalhole and a back yard. Only one room was heated (coal fire), chilblains, chapped legs, falls and broken collar bones, bedroom windows frozen on the inside, and outside loo frozen up. I think we acquired a bathroom by carving out part of the already poky back bedroom. The National Health Service didn't make its appearance until the following July, and rationing of nearly everything didn't finally disappear until July 1954, when meat and other foodstuffs were freed from restriction. Even sweets and chocolates had to wait until mid-1953. I still recall being deeply unimpressed on those occasions when I arrived at Mr Arrowsmith's sweetie shop only to find that he hadn't got any!

And yet, the nineteen fifties really were much more fun, and before the end of that decade I had left home to go to university and to meet my future wife on a bus going from Leeds to Ilkley Moor one November Sunday. Watch this space!!!!!

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




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


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Pete's Point of View
