Saltash Town Council Hears Update on Drug and Alcohol Support Services

At a recent Town Council meeting, representatives from Cornwall's commissioned drug and alcohol service provided an overview of the support available for individuals facing issues with prescription drugs, illicit substances, and alcohol.

The presentation covered access to services for both adults and young people aged 11 to 18, as well as recovery support including treatment planning, detox preparation, rehabilitation, and aftercare. Collaboration with other services such as housing and benefits was also highlighted.

Specialist teams offer targeted support for families, women, veterans, and those in outreach settings, alongside with volunteers lived

experience. The team outlined further support through the Harm Reduction Service, which operates on a non-abstinencebased approach. This service focuses on assisting individuals to manage their substance use responsibly, emphasising control over usage and methods. Support includes needle exchange programs, anti-overdose kits for opiates, self-drug testing kits, the option for users to send drugs for testing, and opiate substitute therapy.

Chamber Chairman Peter Ryland Keeping Us Updated

t the last Chamber meeting on the 7th April, members welcomed Lindsay Endean from Saltash Studios and heard from her the progress that has been made, since taking over the

former Barclays Bank building in Fore Street. The building was now up and running after major refurbishment and facilities included hot desking, arts programme, cinema and other arts and businessrelated facilities. Saltash Studios have now become a member of the Chamber.

Hilary Frank then reported on the Magic Tenner campaign which ran for the first two weeks of March and proved very popular with retailers and the public. 29 businesses had signed up to the campaign all of which were local businesses which is the aim of the campaign to shop local. Members felt that with the success of the campaign it would be worth considering other promotions during the year. Ms. Frank undertook to do so once the local elections were out of the wav

Continuing on the town centre theme, the Chairman was able to update members on the success of the first street market organised by Town Team. The feedback from stallholders, traders and the public, was all positive. Members were looking forward to the next market which was, at the time of the meeting, due 12 days later. The local M.P. Anna Gelderd, had been due to attend the meeting but had been called to London on Parliamentary business. One of the questions that was going to be asked of her was relating to the recently approved toll increase and a campaign to try and get a further reduced rate for local residents. The Chairman stated that she had offered to answer any written questions that members wished to raise and would be willing to attend our meeting in September.

Members noted that the switch on of the Christmas lights would be on November 14th and that the Chamber and the Town Council were working together to make this an evening event in addition to the Christmas Festival on the 6th December.

Other reports received by members included the Chairman reporting on a meeting he had attended with Corserve who were taking on the running of the Belle Vue West car park, an update on the May Fair, where all preparations were in place, an update on the town brochure which was progressing well and that new seating, planters, signage in Fore Street should be in place in the next couple of months. It was also noted, the work carried out by Cormac on the pavements in Fore Street to ensure trip hazards were removed around the roots of the trees.

Although writing this report on behalf of the Chamber, I, wearing my Town Team hat, would also take the opportunity to thank the people of PL12 for their support of the street market. A second market has been held on the 19th April and again there was good support and positive response. The butcher was "over the moon" and the baker, again, sold out of bread.

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dissatisfaction at the way things are going nationally. One by one, experienced and hard-working Councillors, with roots in their communities, were being supplanted by candidates who had come together under a common banner, but in many cases with little or no of local experience government, or perhaps having no local connection.

Indeed, some of the newly elected Cornwall Councillors seemed unprepared for the possibility of winning one of the 87 seats that form Cornwall Council, together with a lack of understanding of the commitment and travelling required to attend regular meetings in Truro. I would say that putting yourself forward as a candidate is one thing, that's the easy bit, delivering on behalf of the electorate is quite another. I suspect that a few by-elections might occur, which would be at a cost to the local taxpayer.

It is being claimed that the two-party system which has existed in this country for around a century, is now at an end, but I'm not so sure. Have we forgotten the UK results of the European Elections held in May 2019 when the map was painted the turquoise colour of the then Brexit Party? Later that year the Conservatives gained an 80-seat majority at the General Election. Can we be sure that the message of 2025 is not similar to that of 2019. an expression of dissatisfaction and a warning shot across the bows of the established parties? Only time will tell. Nationally and locally, the

Conservatives suffered heavy

As an adolescent, it was my job to empty the kitchen bin. At busy times as often as every other day. It was the last resting place for all that was not wanted in the household. I recall the struggle to lift the bag without tears or splits, and the risky dash to the garden. Within would be food, packaging, broken toys, small electricals, clothes, the contents of ashtrays and fireplaces, surprise items such as broken lightbulbs and mugs. All bathed in the inevitable 'bin-juice' which was just waiting to break free.

I am sure I am not alone in such recollections. We got to that point quickly. Up until the mid 20th century, waste had looked much the same for centuries. Prior to 1945, most domestic rubbish was organic and it was burned, what was left was predominantly ceramics and low-toxicity ash. With the advent of mass consumerism and cheap plastics in the 1960s. this became untenable. The

result was the Clean Air Act and spiralling landfill. Fast forward to the 1990s when I was doing my chores. Our waste volumes had peaked and included a dizzying breadth of engineered materials, unimaginable a generation before many of which will survive in the landscape for millennia.

Our refuse has become so chemically complex and longlasting. Landfill is essentially permanent storage. Extrapolate that to 60 million people and separation and reuse is unavoidable. Granted we didn't do it before, but we didn't need to. Modern materials demand modern waste management. We can't have our cake and bury it. If you have done the arithmetic with me, I hope you will come to the same conclusion.

I will apply for co-option to the Town Council as there are three vacant seats and hope to be elected. I believe I will be the only candidate who applied to be Councillor in the traditional way.

I am in communication with the Electoral Commission to question why an Electoral Services error cannot be corrected. I am sorry to those
