

# The Day a Famous Scotsman Came to Town



engineering legends complemented each other as Flying Scotsman, country's oldest mainline working loco, heralded by its shrill steam whistle, crept majestically over Brunel's Royal Albert Bridge on October's first Saturday this year. Passengers returned waves from sold-out carriages as crowds of cheering Saltash spectators, from pre-school to pensioners, packed every available vantage point, including the road bridge and platforms.

enthusiastic lineside reception was repeated everywhere as the 95 year old veteran sped through the Duchy towards Penzance on its maiden foray into the county.

Now owned by York's National Railway Museum, double record-holder Flying Scotsman was the first steam engine to officially reach 100mph in 1934, and in 1989 achieved the longest-ever, non-stop steam run of 422 miles whilst touring Australia. (An innovative corridor through the tender

# **Secretary of State Meeting Raises** Hope of Money for A38 improvements



heryll Murray, Member of Parliament for South East Cornwall, convened a meeting with the Secretary of State for Transport, Chris Grayling MP, to discuss improvements to the A38.

The cross party meeting involved a number Conservative MPs, a Labour MP from Plymouth and a Lib Dem Councillor from Cornwall. The meeting also had MPs, Councillors and Councils from Devon & Cornwall as well as

the Safe 38 group.

In his presentation, Nigel Blackler, the Service Director for Transport at Cornwall Council, outlined the case for action. This case outlines the wider economic case which shows that nearly £900m of productivity growth and investment would be gained by improving the A38 between Bodmin and Exeter.

After the meeting Sheryll Murray MP said, "I was really pleased in the positive way Chris (Grayling) reacted to the presentation and I am hopeful that some improvements to this important infrastructure artery will be undertaken in the next road investment strategy period starting in 2020 with more significant improvements after that. This road is so important to so many of my constituents and I am determined that improvements take place."

Following public consultation it was decided that the charge for a private car should be increased from £1.50 to £2 for a single crossing, with all other vehicle charges to be increased proportionately, Charges for using the Tamar Tag will increase similarly, with the account fee for tag holders upped to £1 per

**Decision Notice Number:** CCN046/17 **Complainant:** Mr Matthew Coot

Subject Member: Cllr John Brady, Saltash Town Council

Date of Assessment: 20th April 2018

Complaint: The Complainant has alleged since the Decision Notice CCN002/17/18 was issued, which found Councillor John Brady to be in breach of the Code and asked him to apologise to the Complainant, Councillor John Brady has failed to apologise and therefore has again failed to treat the Complainant with respect.

Action: That, due to the failure to provide the Complainant with an apology within 28 days of decision notice CCN002/17/18 Councillor John Brady has breached the Code of Conduct for Cornwall Council as set out in this notice.

As a result of this breach of the Code of Conduct the recommended action is that Councillor John Brady be censured by Saltash Town Council.

#### The recommended resolution is:

It was **RESOLVED** that STC supports the findings of the Monitoring Officer in Decision Notice CCN046/17 and expects Councillor John Brady to comply with the actions as imposed by the Monitoring Officer.

#### It was RESOLVED that:

- 1. In accordance with Decision Notice CCN046/17 issued by the Monitoring Officer in respect of a breach of the Council's Code of Conduct, Councillor John Brady be formally censured for failing to provide the Complainant with an apology within 28 days of decision notice CCN002/17/18. STC believes that an individual councillor's actions and conduct will always reflect on the wider role of a councillor and, as a direct consequence, will inevitably impact on the reputation of their fellow councillors and the Council as a whole both generally and specifically. This council believes that it is incumbent on all councillors to ensure the public have confidence and trust in their elected representatives, the Council is disappointed that Councillor John Brady's actions are not in keeping with this belief.
- The censure be clearly published on STC website, social media sites, minutes of the Council, press release and press notice.

#### **New Councillor Elected**

altash has gained a new Lib Dem town councillor following a contested election for the South Ward. Sarah Martin won the seat with 364 votes against Independent Mark Fox who gained 334 votes in a 22.7% turnout.

## **Restructure of Council Committees Promises Speedier Decisions and Best Value**

major and radical restructure of the organisation of Saltash Town Council and its various committees is aimed to speed up its procedures by reducing bureaucracy and to save council taxpayers money.

At present there are a number of committees including Burial Board and Burial Authority, Policy and Resources, Staffing and Services. All of these can, and most do, have their own sub committees. There are also two full council meetings, a month, one

always on the first Thursday, and another to deal with planning issues.

The Town Council has now voted in a change to the committee structure increasing their powers so that they each have their own budget and may resolve their own affairs with no need to report to full council. There are two exceptions, staffing. which largely deals with confidential issues concerning Town Council employees, and the Burial Board and Burial Authority. Due to the nature of their work they will remain

Under the new scheme all councillors will be members of the Policy and Resources committee and Services committee. Sub committees will be removed unless set up for a specific purpose such as information gathering.

Planning issues will now be dealt with by a formal planning committee which will elect its own chairman, not necessarily the Mayor.

All of these changes are expected to be in place by 30th March 2019.

In preparing their recommendations for change, Policy and Resources

committee members considered that the current and long standing system of sub committees and working parties meant that in 90% of cases proposals were taking around four to six months or longer to get resolved. It had also led to members feeling excluded from the decision making process. restructuring will, it is anticipated, allow the decision making process of the council to be more effective as well as bring it to a level where accountability and revenue expenditure is effective in providing 'best value'.

#### Long Term Tunnel Closure Angers Residents on Diversion Route

six month long closure of the Saltash tunnel is alarming residents of New Road, who face constant all night traffic past their homes.

The first that they heard of it was just two weeks before it was due to start, when a letter from Highways England dated 22nd October advised that work would commence on 5th November and aimed to end on 31st March 2019. The hours of work are from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. on Mondays to Fridays inclusive.

Closure was to be postponed until 10 p.m. on Bonfire Night, 5th November, and the Plymouth Christmas Lights event, 15th November. Work would also cease over the Christmas period from 22nd December to 6th January.

The reason given is that of safety and the need to upgrade incident the detection system. A new system to be installed in the tunnel will include emergency evacuation signs, separate smoke and heat detection systems and a public address system. Early and automatic detection of any vehicle fire within the tunnel can then be followed by public announcements and illuminated signs indicating the nearest safe tunnel exit.

Apologies in advance have been given by Highways England for any inconvenience and noise disturbance for those living along the diversion route through residential streets of Saltash

Residents are however angered at receiving such short notice of such long term work. 'I will have to move into the back of my home for half a year', one resident complained.

## Planning Committee Changes Enhance Attendance

Historically meetings were held at 6.15 p.m. and were immediately followed by committee meetings for staffing or policy and resources.

The 6.15 p.m. start, it was noted, made it difficult for those councillors who work, especially outside Saltash, to get to them. After discussion it was agreed to reschedule these meetings for 7p.m. It was also agreed that no other meetings should be held on the same evening, which should improve the debating time and allow members to go home prior to attending meetings which should not continue for more than the two and half hours' time recommended. However, should committee meetings for staffing or policy and resources not reschedule their meeting dates the existing meeting schedule of dates and times will continue.

Council debating the proposals at their November meeting. By the time you read this issue of the Observer the decision whether to devolve or not will have been made?

The Library devolution is going well with both sides working closely to an agreed timeline.

Tenders for the Station

Tenders for the Station Building refurbishment have been opened and are as I write being scrutinised. The tenders are again being debated at the Saltash Town Council meeting in November.

There is a lot of work ahead for Council staff and members in the coming months to achieve all that I have mentioned. extraordinary meeting of the Town Council in the Guildhall attended by Police and security personnel. Following a petition for a parade the Town's Chamber of Commerce subsequently agreed to arrange one from the 'Brunel Inn' to the Peace between the two minutes silence and the pebble laying.

There had been a silence held in his memory at the recent annual general meeting of the Community Enterprises PL12, as the organisation is now known.

Liam had also been prominent in establishing friendly relations with the Plougastel community through the Saltash Twinners.

He had suffered ill health two years ago but had continued to be active until shortly before his death, which came as a surprise and shock to the many that knew him. 'No one is irreplaceable', David Yates concluded, 'but Liam came very close to it.'

### Snow in the Air and Stiltwalkers on the Ground

altash Chamber of Commerce invites you to celebrate the start of the festive season right here in the heart of our town together with hundreds of Santas on bikes, stiltwalkers and lanterneers. The town's Christmas Lights will be switched on just after 5pm by the Citizen and Young Citizen of the Year, and the lights will add an extra glow to the town as the countdown to Christmas Day begins in earnest.

#### Waterside Inn Site Development Considered as Flood Risk

The long derelict 'Waterside' public house, considered to be detrimental to the otherwise attractive Waterside scene, is the subject of an application to demolish it and replace it with a three storey building to include a shop or cafe and four apartments.

The application was however recommended for refusal by the Town Council, concerned over flooding risk to the low lying site.

This is the latest episode in the saga of the formerly popular public house closed since 2009. A previous application to re-develop a cafe and apartments with garaging below was eventually granted, but no work was done. Meanwhile the building continued to deteriorate and has been named as a dangerous structure, as a result of which the Town Council has been negotiating with Cornwall Council over the seeking of a compulsory purchase order.

Premier Developments (1995) Ltd, have now resurrected the lapsed application previously approved by Cornwall Council but with conditions concerning a flood alleviation scheme.

The Town Council's recommendation for refusal was based on a report from the environment agency on flooding risk. The refusal states that there is 'insufficient information submitted to demonstrate that the proposed development

## Two Years to Wait on **Hospital's Future**

The much loved hospital of St. Barnabas, whose wards have remained empty since early 2017, will continue to have an uncertain future possibly until Spring 2020.

Although the in-patient facilities remain closed the building continues to be well used with a considerable number of out -patient clinics held there. It is a base for health visitors serving the Saltash community and for a variety of adult and children's services.

The minor injuries unit, which was 'temporarily closed suddenly at the end of 2016, and its staff transferred to Liskeard hospital in February 2017, shows no sign of re-opening on the site. This is despite road signs continuing to point to a minor

injuries unit at the hospital. The historic building dating from 1888 continues to deteriorate, as Deputy Mayor Mrs Gloria Challen has recorded and shown to the Town Council.

A report on the future of St. Barnabas and two other Cornish Cottage hospitals has been published and the NHS recommended consultation be taken and options prepared. However these might not be completed before April 2020 though timelines will be accelerated whereever possible

## Have your say in shaping **Cornwall Council's budget**

a huge part in many people's lives in Cornwall. It is the biggest employer in Cornwall, and every year it spends over a billion pounds providing public services that the people of Saltash and Cornwall use every day, like collecting rubbish, maintaining a safe road network, enforcing trading standards and taking actions to help create a thriving economy.

In these days of financial austerity, however, Cornwall Council faces some big financial challenges; the population of Cornwall is growing, people are generally living longer, and they have more complex needs in terms of social care. At the same time, grants from central Government have reduced significantly, and Cornwall Council has had to make cuts of around £350 million to deal with increasing financial pressures. Over the next four years, its spending needs to be reduced by a further £70 million. Some tough decisions will need to be made.

Over the last few months. the 10 councillors in Cornwall Council's Cabinet have been working with Cornwall Council officers to draft plans of how money should be spent for the financial year from April 2019. Details of their draft Budget have been released, including proposals increase Cornwall Council's element of the Council Tax by 3.99%, and are currently being scrutinised and debated by councillors.

Councillors are also keen to hear views on the draft Budget from as many residents as

ornwall Council plays possible, and the Council is undertaking a series of consultations stakeholders and the general public. As part of this, Councillor Julian German, Deputy Leader of Cornwall Council will be at a meeting in Saltash Guildhall in the evening of 3rd December. And last October, Councillor Adam Paynter, Leader of Cornwall Council, spent 2 hours on Fore Street, talking passers-by with about Cornwall Council's draft budget. Here are his thoughts on his time in Saltash: "The feedback was varied, but people generally understood that Cornwall Council is receiving much less money from central government. Some were happy to pay more council tax to support essential services, but others did not want any tax rises. It was a busy 2 hours, and I was pleasantly surprised by how many people were over shopping from Plymouth!"

The opinions and views will be used to shape the final Budget proposal that will be taken to Full Council in February 2019. Elements such as the impact of the Chancellor's budget statement or public opinion can lead to changes in the final settlement, and Cornwall Council is inviting the public to help shape their budget by taking part in a public meeting or in the online survey. The survey, along with information on the budget, can be found on Cornwall Council's website. and the closing date is 17th December. Paper copies are available from Cornwall Councillors.

n general I operate by the principle that one of the best things an ex-Mayor can bring is silence: the job of Mayor is tough enough without lots of public second-guessing from people who've been there before. A bit of quiet gentle advice in private can be very useful - indeed I benefitted from such myself - but in public there should, in normal circumstances, only be one Mayor commenting at once.

However, there are limits. In the last week or so I've variously been in Exeter, Plymouth, and Bristol, and in all of those places the mention of Saltash has caught people's attention and for the same reason. It's not the first time Saltash has become nationally recognised but sadly this time it's not because we have the 'best postcode to live in the UK' or highly successful sports teams, or support for our campaign to protect our borders. This week whenever Saltash got mentioned people wanted my opinion of the remembrance parade, and doubly so when they found out that I used to be the Mayor: the most popular refrain being 'would you have cancelled it then?'

And the answer has to be 'no'. In honesty the idea wouldn't even have occurred to me – I do recall being asked when planning the 2010 remembrance service whether I wanted a parade, but the answer was an immediate 'ves' and we quickly moved on to

was to the church, who would

send out the invitation letters and so on. It was actually very little work for me as Mayor the Guildhall Staff sent out invitations and organised road closures, my Chaplain prepared the service, the Town Clerk and Town Sergeant organised the civic party and regalia, and the Royal British Legion took care of the parade marshalling. Similarly I don't recall any other Mayor in my time, and I served with ten of various parties and none, contemplating not having a parade. As I recall we also all managed to organise the timings of the events so that noone went hungry either, which the current Mayor offered as his explanation for the lack of parade. 'Cold' and 'wet' did depend somewhat on the weather, but I don't remember anvone complaining, least of all the children who proved a rather hardier bunch than the current Mayor seems to have given them credit for.

So frankly I find it bizarre that any Mayor of a town where hundreds of residents have made the supreme sacrifice, as recently as Afghanistan in 2009 and including the firefighters and scout killed during the blitz, should contemplate such a thing, let alone on the centenary of the end of the



Great War. You might argue that the Mayor's decision was honestly reached, that he hadn't realised how strongly people felt, but he should have realised and any other Mayor I've known would have realised. Of course everyone makes mistakes - if anyone thinks I'm claiming to have got nothing wrong in my year as Mayor then I'll happily correct them – but this is no small error of the sort we all make on a regular basis.

I am aware that the council, in passing a no confidence motion in the Mayor, also considered other concerns, as indeed have the Cornwall Council Standards Committee. and it's right that those are properly aired. However even leaving those aside this issue alone should be enough to cause any Mayor to consider his position.

There's one final question I have been asked a couple of times this week: if, when you were Mayor, the council had passed a motion of no confidence in you, what would you have done? The answer is that I would have recognised that my position was untenable and I would have resigned within the day. Adam Killeya

## Scrapstore Offers Environmentally Friendly Family Fun

n amazing array of useful and fun materials, which can be used, by children, adults, groups or individuals with Limagination is on offer environmentally friendly Scrapstore.

Predominantly volunteer run the Fore Street store, just up from the 'Brunel Inn', can provide, in its spacious premises, not only a range of new and used materials but workshops giving fun ideas as to how to use them.

The retail side of the venture, run under the town's Community Interest Company, is there to back up the policy of reuse, reduce and recycle, to limit landfill. Aimed in particular at schools and youth groups it also offers individuals and families such new stock as felt, coloured papers, ribbons and glitter including some gorgeous craft paper, and much more. A massive donation has enabled Saltash Scrapstore to make available surplus requirements from businesses, materials which could otherwise have been dumped.

Alongside the new stock is a fascinating and random variety of commercial waste with recyclable potential. This can include packaging, wood, plastic, off cuts, screws and bubble wrap. Local households are invited to donate their own unwanted items which can be give new example old that are being doorknobs replaced. The imaginative scrapstore volunteers are already coming up with ideas, for example recycling old videotapes into toy wheels and Halloween masks. satisfied customer constructing a large boat from items such as tin cans and knitting needles.

If your imagination needs stimulation and some guidance then a series of onsite workshops are being organised at the rear of the Simple workshops to show children how to create items from discards with seasonal themes such as Halloween, Christmas and Easter, will run alongside adult workshops on such themes as flower arranging (real and artificial) leather work and basic sewing. 

## Films Show Both Sides of Western Front

wo acknowledged classics of the cinema, both sympathetically portraying the reality of war, but one from each side of the trenches, are to be shown to Saltash audiences during the centenary month of the end of World War I. The films are being put on at Ashtorre by the World War I Commemoration Committee.

'The first great anti-war film (indeed the first classic film) of the sound era, remarkable for its pacifist message', is film critic Barry Norman's description of 'All Ouiet on the Western Front'. Telling the tale of a group of optimistic and patriotic German schoolboys, it takes them to the grotesque squalor of trench warfare where its final shot, according to Barry Norman, 'still provides one of vivid most and unforgettable moments in all

This German classic of 1930 can be contrasted with a recent British film of 2018, the cinematic portrayal of R.C. Sherriff's 'Journeys End'. The 1928 play, praised by G.B. Shaw as 'a useful corrective to the romantic conception of war', well converts to film that portrays British trenches of the eve of the 1918 German 'Great Push'

The stressful relationships between veteran officers is emphasised by the arrival of the idealistic Raleigh, straight from public school where he had hero-worshipped Stanhope, now his neurotic whiskysodden Captain. Here too the closing moments between them fully emphasis the pity of war.

The two films will be shown at Ashtorre at 7 p.m. on Sunday 18th November and 2nd December respectively. There will be opportunity for those who wish to discuss them afterwards. Admission is free, donations welcomed.
