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



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t the Chamber meeting on the 14th October 2024, we welcomed 2 new members. Dawes Accountants and Westcountry Fabrications. The start of the meeting was the AGM, all Officers were re-appointed but when this formality was out of the way there were several matters which were concerning members

Firstly, was the impact of the imminent works to the Saltash Tunnel on the town with long queues of traffic blocking various roads in the town which will inevitably have an impact on business. For the businesses on the industrial estates the concern relates to the ability to access their units by suppliers and the egress for their own deliveries. In the town centre businesses were of the opinion that traffic regularly queuing up Fore Street would deter customers from coming to the town centre. I have agreed to take up the issue with National Highways to see what mitigation can be put in place and whether traders can be compensated for loss of trade. As a post meeting note, I have an offer for a representative from National Highways to come to a Chamber meeting and discuss the matter.

Secondly, was the question of car parking. The Chamber has strived over the years to make the cost of parking cheaper for customers. Tracey from the Bookshelf said that, in her opinion, that the scheme where customers could get the cost of parking for up to 2 hours redeemed was the most successful. However, it was acknowledged that with many people now paying on the App it wasn't so easy to implement

such a scheme, but I have agreed to do some research to see what can be instigated.

Thirdly, the question of cash availability at the two remaining ATMs in the town was raised. It seems that on a regular basis the machines ran out of cash and, although we are becoming a cashless society, this caused great difficulty for some sectors of the population who rely on cash. I agreed to take this matter up with the Banking Hub to see if there is any chance that an ATM could be installed there - although they had said, in the past, that such was not possible. I would also look at other possibilities.

Fourthly, the condition of

the industrial estate highways was raised. The Chamber congratulated Samantha Hammond of Westcountry Fabrications on her initiative to have planters on the verge sides of Gilston Road. It was understood that this had got the approval of Saltash Town Council and Samantha hoped to instigate such in the near future. However, members were concerned as to the poor parking of vehicles and the restrictions this placed on accessibility for deliveries throughout the estates. The Chamber agreed to support any initiatives which helped the situation.

But I also have concerns at the number of salaried positions within some very important organisations, nationally and locally, that over the years have been replaced with volunteer positions. any of us have unsettling periences healthcare these days. The stark reality is that without comprehensive change, the situation is likely to worsen. Cornwall's population, for example, is growing and ageing rapidly: over the next 20 years, we expect an increase of around 83,000 people, with an 87% rise in those aged 85 or over.

As a councillor, I recently joined Cornwall Council's Overview Scrutiny Committee. I've been actively involved in the Saltash Health Action Group so this felt like a natural step. I'd like to share a message the Chief Medical Officer of the Integrated Care Board gave at a recent meeting: he stressed that the NHS is "changing to better meet the needs of people in our community, emphasising a shift towards community-based care.

This direction aligns with updates the Saltash Health Action Group has received from Derriford Hospital, where there's a strong push to bring 'Care Closer to Home' hospital is actively exploring various options, including offering blood tests in Saltash.

A recent independent review of the health service by Lord Darzi highlighted critical conditions, with growing waiting lists and declining national health. The government has initiated a 'national conversation', inviting ideas for a 10-year Health Plan - you'll be able to share your suggestions via the online change.NHS.uk, platform launching early next year.

But before that, you have a chance to influence healthcare locally. Together with my fellow Trustees of St Barnabas Hospital League of Friends, we are committed to transforming the charity into a healthcare advocate. We aim to leverage

A lot of men experiencing cancer died between 50 and 60 years of age and many children deformed. No proof was available for verification.

The town crier John Foster read out a nineteenth century proclamation at the first and last stones and volunteers including mayor, deputy mayor and walk leader Martin Lister were bumped on several of the stones in accordance with tradition.

Botus Fleming church, with its crusader knight's tomb, was opened for the walkers and parishioners kindly supplied refreshment in the church hall nearby.

of old cherry Tales orchards. copper mines, proposed railway lines, smugglers were among those related by Martin Lister who also remarked how Saltash parish is almost entirely surrounded by water with just half a mile of land boundary around the former Holland Inn separating Clerks Lake and Cocks Lake which mark the northern boundary.

At Notter Bridge Inn there was time for refreshment before the buses took the walkers on to St Germans station. southern boundary of the parish was travelled by train and upon arriving in Saltash bound-beaters went straight into Isambard House. the former station building for a sumptuous cream tea and cakes. problem of homelessness is increasing nationally and locally. prompting what Saltash methodist minister Jonathan Budd admits to being an 'audacious' solution to a drastic problem.

'We can and do offer the homeless food, clothing and washing facilities', former county councillor and lay methodist Derek Holley told the Observer. 'But then we have to tell them that we are closing, and they must leave in order to put up a tent on waste ground or find a doorway to sleep in. What they really need and what we cannot offer at present is a warm home where they can sleep and prepare meals.'

A small group of concerned persons including Jonathan Budd and Baptist minister Tim Parkman after discussion as to how to respond locally to this national problem have launched an appeal for local people to donate their homes to the homeless. 'If we had say two four bedroomed houses or one large seven bedroomed property, we could take homeless people off the streets and help restore their dignity and selfworth while seeking a longterm solution', those who attended the launch of the campaign at Saltash Wesley church were told. Any donated properties would be looked upon to provide longterm temporary housing. The Saltash based organisation would act as intermediary with a specialist organisation taking over administrationof the properties.

Homelessness is generally a result of mental health issues, family breakdown or alcohol or drug addiction, this last often following family breakdown, explained Derek Holley. Once a home has been found other issues can be tackled.

'We know this to be a long-term plan but we cannot just continue to push these people on and many of them have local roots', added Derek.

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Tamar Reflections Forder

Reflections Saltash has so many wondrous areas and views of breathtaking beauty and boasts numerous historical reflections of times past. Many I have mentioned in Tamar Reflections over the

past years /In particular, I refer to the beautiful settlement of Forder. I have reflected upon the picturesque area of Forder on several occasions and there are countless more stories to tell.

Forder, situated on the outskirts of Saltash is located in an area of outstanding natural beauty from all corners of its tiny hamlet and takes us into the countryside, hosting Antony Passage, Shillingham, Trehan and Trematon.

Forder Lake/Creek

Forder is the pathway to a variety of views of Forder Lake - often referred to as Forder Creek: where beauty spots of the surrounding fields, woodlands and hills can be seen; with HMS Brecon majestically moored in the distance at Jupiter Point. Brecon is still in use for recruits' training purposes from HMS Raleigh; and there are skeletal hulks hauntingly resting within the mud and silt with their own stories to tell; many that I have written about in Tamar Reflections in the past.

. 'Marigold'

Furthermore, the famous Victorian yacht 'Marigold' which the famous late actor David Niven sailed, was lovingly restored to its former

glory beneath Forder Viaduct over an 11 year period - and completed in the early 90's. I well remember watching from the upper roadway over the years whilst the restoration was being undertaken and completed.

Trematon Castle

Approaching Forder from Burraton Coombe, visitors can catch a magical glimpse of Trematon Castle on the distant hill. Neighbouring Trematon Castle is a Motte and Bailey construction dated from soon after the Norman Conquest. I of-course covered Trematon Castle in previous issues of the Saltash Observer too!

Forder Lake is a tidal inlet off the River Lynher and is an integral part of the village life its colourful boat moorings and walkways into Church Town Farm Nature Reserve. woodlands and historically named fields leading into ancient St Stephens and Wearde.

Forder Community and **Conservation Association**

Forder Creek, which is abutted by local inhabitants who help care for the village and its surrounding natural under the environment, auspices of the Forder Community and Conservation Association (FCCA), which is a registered charity, and of which I am the proud Patron. Moreover, a small group of Trustees, supported by other villagers, supporters, volunteers and the wider populace, guard the village of Forder and the surrounding areas jealously, and oversees the village preservation, protection and conservation. Indeed, if the little Forder waterways could reveal some

of its intriguing past history,

many more books would have been written about this tranquil and enchanting place. Nurse Edgecombe -

'Atalanta

I know that my late friend Elsie Edgecombe, who was often warmly referred to as 'Nurse Edgecombe' - would have been an ideal person to write in more detail about her family's time living on their yacht on the banks of the Forder Creek.

Some years ago, I asked Elsie to write down a short account of her time living in Forder on their vacht 'Atalanta' during 1949 - 1957

Elsie said that her and her husband Jack (Edgecombe) bought the yacht after hearing about it by Jack's cousin the well-known and respected authority on local history and affairs the (late) Jack Crosley. Jack Edgecombe and his father Reg refurbished the interior, and Elsie and Jack on completion went on board to live when their eldest, Liz was a month old.

Elsie said that the yacht could sleep 10 and had a tiny galley with a very large primus stove with 4 burners on top, which was more than adequate for cooking food.

Water and electric she said came from Jack's workshop on the quay. Elsie and Jack were moored just below the then Forder Chapel (now a residency).

The 'Atalanta' was very

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roomy and Elsie and Jack held the children's birthday parties on deck. In addition Elsie said that they very much enjoyed crabbing from the aft end of the yacht with many of the village children invited to join

Elsie said that with Jack going on Discovery ll in 1957 as the ship's carpenter, she was unable to cope with the yacht and all the work that was needed to keep it in good order; so as a result they bought a cottage in Forder

Yacht Damaged

Sadly, the prospective buyer for 'Atalanta' in trying to undertake some restoration work, banged and chipped away at the hull of the yacht whilst Elsie was out all day and Jack was at work and no one was overseeing the work. Consequently a hole was made in the vacht below the waterline. All the possessions and treasures on boat were removed quickly with help of friends and neighbours in the Forder Village as the tide was coming in very fast.

The Saltash Fire Brigade pumped water out and the hole was plugged!

'Claremont'

Sometime later Jack went to sea Elsie said, and her and by then their two children Liz 8 years and Patrick 5 1/2 years moved into 'Claremont'

About a month afterwards, Elsie said that she was going for a post as District Nurse S.R.N. – but she couldn't find her official General Nursing Certificate, so she went back on board 'Atalanta' and found her Victorian writing box in the cupboard. The paperwork she said was very damp, but at least she found it intact, albeit very mildewed!

The 'Atalanta' was by this time in 1957 due to the damage, not fit for purpose and was sold for scrap.

But Elsie was able to reflect upon 8 wonderful years on board the yacht within the Forder Creek. Her and Jack were eventually able to purchase a 14 foot motor boat to cruise up and down the river, which she said was wonderful!

I occasionally visited Elsie

Later years

when she moved to lower Burraton some years later. Elsie was hard working and a stalwart of Saltash and a much respected District Nurse and community volunteer within local worthy organisations. I also remember Jack well, who loved to paint local scenes of interest. I sometimes bump into Liz as we share similar interests in bygones items and artefacts. Patrick I have only met on rare occasions

More Drama for Forder as Lorry is Firmly Stuck

drama unfolded at Forder Village on the outskirts of Saltash when a delivery lorry got firmly stuck in a narrow lane at the bottom of Castle Hill. writes Sue Hooper.

The large Boon transport HGV vehicle was wedged between an old and important period house and a hedge in the lane on Monday morning September 30th and was not moved until Wednesday October 2nd.

Seemingly, the vehicle was transporting 40 tons of seeds to a local farm when it took the wrong road to its destination and met its demise in the ancient Forder village.

Thanks to recovery personnel, the cargo was eventually removed from the vehicle and the lorry cab was also removed before the operation to recover the trailer could proceed.

Roads were diverted and around 30 homes in the village had their power switched off while the clearance took place, with the lorry finally being freed more than 48 hours after being trapped.

The Devon and Cornwall Fire Service and Police made valiant endeavours to ease the situation, but the sheer size and weight of the trapped



lorry made their attempts impossible

Eventually, it was the same salvage Company from Truro - Macsalvors Plant Hire -that had rescued a trapped lorry in 2007 that once again saved the day by lifting the trailer over the abutting garage and gardens and with great precision placing the trailer onto the road.

The 80-tonne crane lifted the trailer part out of the lane after a nail biting air borne operation.

Local resident Courtney-Crabb said that the driver stayed with his vehicle for the whole of the time and slept in his cab.

Viv continued that the caring villagers provided him with food and drinks and did all they could to help him during his dramatic ordeal.

This tight fit drama was televised and reported in local and national media and once again brought excitement to the otherwise sleepy village of Forder.

In the next three months important things will be happening which should deliver new options for patients wanting local care services.

The Healthcare Action Group has been told that extra GP/primary care appointments may soon be made available to supplement the 2 Surgeries; that more blood testing will be available here in the town; that better coordination of hospital discharges and follow-up services is taking place; and that even a mobile X-Ray service aimed at people who have had falls at home is being considered.

The Action Group is also awaiting new detailed proposals for "care closer to home" from Derriford Hospital, which we hope will include not only the blood testing, but more local clinics providing face-to-face appointments and follow-up in the most used specialties. Finding suitable space will be a key issue, and obviously St Barnabas Hospital is being explored.

Turning now to charitable work to supplement NHS care in the community, it has been decided that the longestablished League of Friends of St Barnabas Hospital will reveal at its Annual General next Meeting month proposals for the charity to widen its scope and change its name accordingly. A very well-attended consultative event took place at the end of last month, with enthusiastic support and valuable suggestions for this new way forward. About 20 new supporters signed up. New Trustees have also been appointed, and the charity will

of course work in collaboration with the Action Group. These changes will ultimately need the approval of the Charity Commission, but the endeavour for healthcare needs to be met more flexibly in the town itself now has great momentum.

The renamed charity will need **supporters** from the community to help run its activities including public events and fund-raising, and it will need **donors** who can provide it with gifts in cash, wills, and property.

The Trustees are inviting new supporters and donors to come forward now. Interested members of the public are welcome at the AGM on Monday, November 18 at 2.30pm at St Barnabas Hospital when fuller details will be presented for approval.
