LOW PARKING CHARGES COMBAT CREDIT CRUNCH

ar parking charges of just ten pence for the first hour are helping Saltash shops in fighting off the effects of the credit crunch.

This nominal charge is encouraging local residents and visitors to park and shop in Saltash and other towns in South East Cornwall.

Now other towns in Cornwall are seeking to persuade the new Cornwall Council to follow the lead of the former Caradon Council in introducing low parking costs to encourage commerce while retaining higher charges for long term parking.

Exceptions include Looe, which owns its own car parks and also has its own agenda concerning tourists, and also Bodmin.

Cornwall Council is due to review all parking charges which are traditionally considered a major source of income to local authorities.

DELIGHT AT RESPONSE OVER PILLMERE ROADS

heryll Murray has spoken of her delight securing an agreement that will see a number of unfinished roads on a Saltash housing estate finally being completed.

Local campaigner Sheryll has been pushing for Cornwall Council to give assurances that a number of roads on estate at Pillmere will be completed after years of standing unsurfaced and incomplete..

Now, after talks with Cornwall Council, she has been assured that the necessary highways works on the estate should be completed by "the end of the financial year"

Sheryll took action on behalf of a number of frustrated residents on the estate after listening to their concerns during a number of canvassing sessions in the

A number of residents on the 600-home estate told Sheryll that they had been waiting years for a number of roads and pathways to be completed - but without success.

The problems arose after the last development on the state, on land just of the A38,m finished more than two years ago, when several roads, footpaths and walkways were left unsurfaced.

Those problems were company which managed the development ceased trading earlier this year - with the work still incomplete.

Having heard the concerns of the residents, Sheryll contacted Cornwall Council on their behalf to see what could be done to rectify the problem.

She has now heard back from councillor Graeme Hicks who, in an email, gave an assurance that "the bond is being called in and Cormac

are being asked to complete the highway works which include the cycle ways. carriageway and footway works. This should all be completed by the end of the financial year. Please note this does not include works on the public open space areas.

In response Sheryll, who is Conservative Prospective MP for South East Cornwall said: "This is a massive step forward for the residents of the Pillmere estate and I am delighted that the roads will finally completed.

"However, I appreciate this will still leave work to be done - such as issues with amenities, drainage and the open spaces. I can assure everyone that I will continue to campaign and argue that these issues are dealt with and that these roads are ultimately adopted.'

GLEBE AVENUE SPEEDING CAUSES CONCERN

Glebe Avenue is being used as an early morning rat run, particularly, it is believed, by parents rushing late children to school.

Local residents have expressed concern at traffic speeding along this residential road especially before 9 a.m.

Buses are also causing concern since this is now a route used by regular services for First and Western Greyhound scheduled routes. Buses coming down the hill, while they may not be exceeding the legal speed limit, are still going at a speed which is excessive for the road conditions, Town Councillors have been told. They have passed these concerns on to local police.

STREET PARKING LIMITS **MUST BE ENFORCED**

Motorists who may believe that the street parking regulations are not normally enforced outside normal working hours could have to think again, town councils throughout Cornwall are hoping.

Saltash Town Council has added its support to Looe, Launceston, Callington and Fowey, all of which have expressed concern at current street parking enforcement. They note that since regulation of on-street parking passed from the police to the local authority in May 2008 the civil enforcement officers have mounted infrequent patrols and these have been mainly restricted to Monday to Friday between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

This is to change, it is anticipated, as the Cornwall Council is urged by Saltash and other towns to extend patrols to cover evenings, weekends and bank holidays. This should problems currently encountered by residents and visitors in negotiating streets. It is of especial importance to ambulances and fire engines which encounter problems caused by illegal street parking.

report on the work within the new "Cornwall Council" through the Saltash Observer. It is still very early days with the council and August has been a time of more training and concentrating on our local community area. I have been attending various training courses on planning and the Regulatory Committee, of which I am the Chairman. The Regulatory Committee is responsible for completely separate agendas, school transport appeals and modification orders (Village Greens and Cornwall footpaths).

I am also a member of the Tamar Bridge and Torpoint Committee Councillor Holley. This is a committee Plymouth City Council and there are six members from each council who meet on a regular basis. One of the main items on our agenda is the increase in tolls for both the bridge and the ferry. I know a lot of people are against this increase understandably so - but I would ask that before you make up your mind you look the www.tamarcrossings.org.uk to enable vou to understand better the need for the increase. This will be a very difficult decision to make but at the end of the day the committee has invested a lot of money to:-

- 1) Upgrade the bridge
- 2) Replace all the ferries 3) Introduce the new Tag system.

There is currently a £300,000 shortfall of monthly income. The discount tolls have not been increased for twelve years and full price tolls have remained the same fifteen. nearly Unfortunately, I see no alternative to our having to Bob Austin CC accept these changes - Cars Cornwall Council

NEW HOMES IN EDWARDIAN ROAD REJECTED

wo contemporary style three-storey houses in a residential road of Victorian and Edwardian homes would be out of keeping with the street scene. They would also add to congestion in what has become a busy service road to Fore Street and one much used by ambulances and other emergency vehicles.

These were among the arguments put forward in eleven letters of objection sent to the Town Council concerning a proposed development in a garden in Essa Road. It was pointed out that they were on the site of a hundred year old wall and that a local plan from 2005 strongly recommended that further development of the gardens in the town centre be avoided.

It was also said that the site was close to a blind corner, the road surface was already breaking up under the impact of increasing heavy traffic and that many ambulances use Essa Road to access the hospital and local residential homes.

"I have met with the Planning Officer who has confirmed there is a duty to facilitate development in existing built up areas close to shops and public transport, as against on green field sites," the applicant's agent Mr Peter Hunkin, told the Council in support of the application. The Highways Agency had confirmed, he stated, that "Essa Road is a quiet residential area," and added "Cars seldom park on the south side of the road." Local residents who packed the public seats vociferously disagreed.

CAR PARK IS DANGER TO DISABLED, RESIDENT **CLAIMS**

he car park in Jubilee Close is dangerous for disabled residents in its present state, one such disabled resident believes.

She has for some time been urging Saltash Town Council to seek that the potholes of this ill-lit area be filled in.

Councillor Bob Austin confirmed to the Town Council that he has taken photographs of the dent in the road and forwarded them to Cornwall Highways. However, he added that he doubted whether, for budgeting reasons, any action would be taken by Cornwall Council.

It was however, agreed that an addition light was needed half way along the path at Jubilee Close. The Town Council has requested that Cornwall Council Housing instal such a light and has promised to be responsible for future energy and routine maintenance costs

Councillor Bruce Reid proposed recommending approval for the development to which the Planning Officer and Highways Department apparently had no objection.

This was opposed by Councillor Derek Holley who believed that County Highways were wrong and the site was near a dangerous corner. "The housing density is inappropriate in this area of Saltash where we need to maintain a range of houses with a range of garden sizes," he added. His proposal to recommend refusal of the plans on the grounds of road safety as well as overdevelopment and the effect on the street scene was agreed by the Town Council by a majority of eight votes

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GATEWAY REPORTS YEAR OF SUCCESS IN LOCAL REGENERATION

third successful year for the Saltash Gateway Community Interest Company, with membership doubled over the last year and a number of regeneration projects well under way, was reported at its annual general meeting.

The not-for-profit company owned by its members, with membership open to all, has as its central aim to promote and carry forward the PL12 area economic and community regeneration for the benefit of workers, residents and visitors in and around Saltash.

Among its major projects the potential development of Broadmoor Farm as a community campus or 'green and sustainable urban extension for Saltash' has hit some problems but is by no means stalled, the chairman reported.

A key element of the plan was provision of a green field site for a rebuilt Saltash Community School but as a replacement for Saltash School is no longer a high priority in the national 'Building schools for the future' programme "It seems to be a game of wait and see," the chairman reported.

Fore Street regeneration, while in its infancy in terms of changes on the ground, is showing signs of real promise following a grant by the South West Regional Development Agency to produce an action plan, now nearing a final draft and anticipated in the Autumn.

Other positive involvement from Gateway directors, includes the Saltash Health Strategy Group which seeks to increase health provision in Saltash and minimise the need for travel to out-patient clinics at Derriford Hospital.

A Sports and Leisure network for the Saltash area is also being promoted through the Caradon Sports

and Recreation Council.

Saltash is already benefiting from its sculpture and art trail, the latest addition to which, the Fore Street 'Dock Dung Seat' was reported in the June 'Saltash Observer.' Another Gateway team is currently looking at tidying up the Saltash foreshore, perhaps with a boardwalk while local parishes are being canvassed as to their transport needs.

A notable success has been the Saltash Loyalty Card with over four hundred sold to date and an increasing number of business joining the scheme aimed to encourage local residents to use local business and keep money in Saltash.

"The Community interest company with your support, can make a difference", the Chairman concluded. "The key to this is making it more widely known to the Saltash and area community. WATERSIDE WAS BUZZING WITH POLICE ON MURDER MYSTERY NIGHT

An exciting murder mystery evening organised as part of the Ashtorre Brunel Bridge anniversary celebrations had an added surprise for the organisers as police arrived to deal with thousands of unexpected visitors buzzing with excitement.

The organisers were preparing for the event on a clear and cloudless afternoon when a small cloud of what organiser Lynn Marsh believed to be flying ants was spotted.

As she watched two passing police community support officers ordered that children eating ice cream on the balcony be brought in and the Ashtorre Centre be sealed off. A swarm of bees had landed on the gateway which leads from the Waterside to the Ashtorre Centre, on Ashtorre Rock. In no time the gateway was a heaving mass of bees six inches deep.

Full time police officers were soon on the scene, children were escorted out, a professional beekeeper called and the Centre sealed off with police tape.

"It was fascinating to watch the beekeeper smoke the swarm out," Lynn told the Observer. "He started by using a swan's feather to dislodge them."

By the time the would-be amateur sleuths arrived to enjoy the murder mystery nothing was left apart from a few rather confused bees seeking their queen. And also some genuine police "crime scene" tape to add authenticity to the intriguing but fictional crime about to take place.

NEW HOME WOULD HARM HISTORIC ESTATE

new two-storey house would harm the character of a historic Victorian housing estate and endanger a wide variety of wildlife enjoying the extensive gardens in the Port View area of Saltash, local residents claimed.

These were among the many objections made in eight letters to the town council regarding plans for a new property to the rear of Higher Port View but with proposed access from a narrow section of Lower Port View.

A 'Historic Saltash Survey' of

2005 referred to the Victorian terrace behind which the house is planned as a 'historic plot'. As well as being out of character in the estate which dates from the 1850's, the house would be at the apex of two wildlife corridors utilised by foxes, badgers, hedgehogs, slowworms, frogs and toads, and would spoil the view over the town enjoyed from the river, local residents claimed. It would be the first such new property built in one of the local large gardens and could set an

unfortunate precedent.

A local resident addressed the council opposing the plan. Nobody was present at the meeting to speak in favour of it. Other concerns included drainage and overlooking existing properties.

The council unanimously recommended refusal of the plans. Grounds for refusal included loss of amenity, being out of keeping with the street scene and character of the area, and traffic concerns. In addition the council called for reports on drainage and on wild life issues.

The recommendation for refusal would be passed on to the County's new "Planning East" Authority.

CROSS SAFELY AT BURRATON CROSS

A zebra crossing at Burraton Cross is under consideration by the town's Road Safety Committee as a means of showing that pedestrians have right of access across.

This follows concern expressed by the town council's Industry Commerce Transportation and Tourism Committee that there is now no local bus service along Callington Road between Burraton Cross and the roundabout by Lidl's store. While it was felt that residents could walk along the road to the nearest bus stop there was concern for their safety at Burraton.

Burraton.

Plymouth Citybus have changed the routing of their No. 26 service to assist with growing employment opportunities in the business park and the growth of passengers wishing to travel from Latchbrook to this area. Citybus consider that overall the alterations improve the level of service provided and have no plans to alter them to re-instate a service along this section of Callington Road.

MUSIC WHILE YOU SHOP

There was dancing in the streets of Saltash as Saturday shoppers were entertained by old-time dance music apparently emanating from an old gramophone placed on the pavement.

Meanwhile a Laurel and Hardy look-alike pair were inviting passers by, as well as some lady residents of St Anne's Residential Home who had accompanied them, to join in a sedate dance down Fore Street.

"Music in the Street" was the latest project from Saltash Environmental Action Group (SEA) aimed to make shopping in Saltash more fun. Its more serious objective is to encourage residents to shop in Saltash boosting the local, largely locally owned businesses and reducing the "carbon footprint" created by driving to the out of town chain stores. Local music promoter Peter Gunn had joined with Godfrey Allen to put on costume and promote the event.

It is hoped to make music a regular feature of shopping in Saltash and to provide a variety of styles of live as well as recorded music.

OPERATION SLOWDOWN

rivers in Cornwall, intent on speeding through built up areas, will be asked to consider the consequences of their speeding in an attempt to make them change the way they think, as well as the way they drive.

In 2008, 34 people were killed on Cornwall's roads, and 175 seriously injured in road collisions. Drivers caught speeding in different locations across the county this year are being targeted by Operation Slowdown, a joint initiative between Cornwall Council (CC) Road Safety Unit, Devon and Cornwall Constabulary and the Safety Camera Partnership. During 2009, 10 Operation Slowdowns will be taken to different locations in Cornwall to catch motorists who ignore speed restrictions. Speeding vehicles will be pulled over by the police and the drivers given the choice of the usual fine and penalty points on their licence, or spending 15 minutes at a nearby location where they will be given an educational session on the consequences of speeding. Professionals from the CC Road Safety Unit, and Devon and Cornwall Constabulary will be asking drivers to consider why they speed, especially in urban areas where pedestrians and children

rivers in Cornwall, in particular, are vulnerable on intent on speeding the roads.

Morwenna Rogers, Project Co-ordinator says "Speed is by far the biggest killer on our roads today. Most people tend to think of dangerous speed in terms of someone hurtling up the dual carriageway but in fact the speeding driver most likely to cause death and injury is the driver who drives at 40mph through a 30mph zone. Cars don't kill people, careless and thoughtless drivers do."

Morwenna continues "The consequences of speeding, and possibly being involved in a collision, have far reaching consequences on the driver's family, friends, and the community at large. We ask that people drive responsibly and think of everyone else who will be affected by their actions."

Speeding through towns and villages is as unsociable as drinking and driving, and speeding drivers not only put themselves at risk but they also expose the communities they drive through to real danger.

MPC Mark Leath, Devon and Cornwall Constabulary Road Casualty Reduction Officer, comments "Speeding is anti-social. The sooner more motorists realise that and slow down to an appropriate speed, the safer our roads will be."

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
