Bridge Faces Deficit – But No Toll Rises Planned

hile motorists continue to struggle with queues as Tamar Bridge resurfacing work enters its final phase there are two pieces of good news. One is that work is currently well up to schedule and should be completed in October.

Secondly despite dire warnings from the Tamar Bridge and Torpoint Ferry management that they are facing a £7 million deficit, councillors have rejected a suggestion that tolls increase by 30% and that the Tamar Tag discount reduce from 50% to 35% to cover this loss.

Instead, councillors have called for the appointment of consultants to prepare a business case for the raising of alternative forms of income as well as the right to increase tolls automatically by the rate of inflation and the retail price index.

Otherwise on present based figures the reserve funds held by the Bridge and Ferry could be exhausted by the end of the

2022/23 financial year and a deficit of over £7.5 million arise by 2024/25.

In addition to the capital expenses incurred in such works as the resurfacing the bridge has been faced with loss of income during the pandemic, with current crossings still only around 87% of pre-pandemic, the ferry usage being around 98%. It is predicted that it may not be until 2025 that crossings equal pre-pandemic level by which time without toll increased the deficit could be

approaching £31/2 million. Although no toll increases are currently proposed they could still be sought following the completion of a new report due to be completed by the end wombob

Anything that helps raise awareness after a summer with such high numbers of incidents and unfortunately fatalities is an

important part of our work as a campaigning group and we very happy to support our partners in this road safety partnership".

The event will also include details of a new project which will see 170 dashcams given out free to businesses that regularly use our road network to allow them to feed into Devon and Cornwall Police's Operation Snap. The first six months of 2021 saw the force receive more than 700 dash cam submissions. Safe38 will be working with National Highways to find partners to take part in their dash cam project targeting the A38 between Carkeel and Trerulefoot.

Saltash Leisure Centre **Threatened with Closure** ornwall Council has published a consultation

document where it is recommending the closure of Saltash and three other public leisure centres in Cornwall. It comes as GLL, the not-for-profit organisation that manages public leisure centres on behalf of Cornwall Council, has informed the Council that financial pressures mean it can no longer afford to run all 13 Cornish centres. The consultation document's statement that if Saltash were to close, any existing demand would be absorbed by provision in Plymouth has angered many Saltash residents.

The consultation will run until the end of October, with Cornwall Council's Cabinet taking a final decision on the fate of the four leisure centres in December.

Tamar Bridge resurfacing project

Anyone travelling across the Bridge can't fail to notice that half of the main deck is now completed, and work on the other half has started. The bus lane on the Plymouth-bound cantilever at the toll booth plaza is now complete, too, with a new red surface. Despite the new surface the use of lane remains the same which is both a bus and tag lane. With the works still expected to be completed by the end of October, we will all breath a collective sigh of relief.

Fore Street resurfacing

There have been some fraught conversations in past weeks with town traders who'd heard rumours about works to begin on resurfacing Fore Street straight after Bridge works have finished. The works to Fore Street have been in the pipeline for a while and

s a Mum of two, I'm anyone who has driven over the bump outside the Coop or looked at the state of the bus bays can see why it's important to get the works done, but coming so soon after the chaos by the Bridge caused resurfacing works, and in the middle of the important pre-Christmas retail period, it is understandable that town traders were feeling frustrated. After appealing to our Cornwall Councillors, the works scheduled for November have thankfully been postponed until Spring next year. Work to remove the humps from the bus bays, which were installed to add space on the pavements during lockdowns, will go ahead in November, however without the need for a road closure. The only section of road that will need to be closed during the day will be the Belle Vue Road between the Belle Vue car parks and Fore Street. Access to the car parks will still be maintained, and we have been promised that any disruption will be kept to a
